Strange Accident-Seven Men Killed. (From the Huron Signal.)

frightful accident occurred two weeks ago in connection with the mills of Messrs. Murray & Williams, on the north shore of Lake Huron. The par ticulars may be learned from the follow ing letter from Mr. Murray to his partner in Goderich.

BLIND RIVER MILLS, Nov. 6th .- We have had a terrible accident here. On Orders left at Mr. Horsman's Store will receive prompt attention. Saturday last, at nine in the morning seven men left here with a scow loaded with poik, corn meal, and oats. They with poik, corn meal, and oats. They got up to the portage at the east end of Lake du Regue, about 12 miles from the mill, all, unloaded the oats and carried them into the granary and piled them all up at one end, one row wide and very high. After they had their supper, they made their bed and lay down with their heads to the oats, and sometime during the night the oats fell down and crushed them all to dea. The accident must have happened on Saturday night, for Louis de C.ts. was in the granary on Sunday morning, and left on Monday morning, and brought down word that they had been there and unloaded the oats, but said he could not see the men anywhere. They did not come on Monday; Thesday was stormy, they could not! come; but Wednosday was fine, and when they had not arrived at four o'clock. I knew there must be something wrong, so I started up alone in a cance and got to the granary at 8 o'clock, and found them buried under the oats. All that could be seen of them was one hand sticking un among the ta, so foats. I then lifte, some bags and found another man, covered up in the blankets, just as he had lain down; he had never been able to stir. I am starting up this morning to bring them down.
