WEEKLY.

Trade this week has been lighter than any week this season. Thursday was the only day that was not counted poor. The weather on Saturday and Tuesday was very bad and unit for forwarding produce. In looking over values we notice only a few changes since our last weekly report.

Wheat has been a disappointment to many. It was paid in one case 65c to 70c being the usual figures. Outside of these two changes there is little alteration to be seen in grain.

Butter was about 1c lower towards the close and eggs 2c higher.

Poultry, ducks and turkeys show no alteration.

Meats were offered sparingly, and prices of beef and lamb held steady, while dressed hogs scored an advance of 2c.

The only difference to be seen in hides and skins was in lamb skins, the ruling price of which was 70c to 80c; demand good. Tanners complain at the prices, and claim they are too high for the price of leather.

Potatoes were the center of attraction in the vegetable line. A good deal of shipping is being done to this point by outsiders and we believe they are costing 70c on the track, few large lots being taken at over that price.

No change occurred in any other kind. Among the fruits there appears to be no change. Trade was steady. Apples, grapes and quinces were the principal receipts.

Hay fluctuated between 6c and 7c, with an occasional lot of extra good quality going at 7c 50. Straw was quiet.

The only kind of live stock offered in any quantity was young pigs. They sold usually at 4c.
