DEATH OF SIR A. T. GALT. A veteran Canadian statesman is dead

Sir Alexander Tulloch Galt, who has been ailing tor a considerable time of cancer in the tongue, and had been in an enfeebled condition. died yesterday at his residence in Montreal. Deceased was a son of John Galt, the author and Canadia pioneer, and was born at Chelsea, England, Sept. 6, 1817. His father brought him to Canada while he was a mere lad. He was first elected to the Canadian Parliament in 1849, and i General to form an administration.
