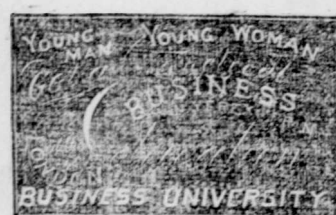

and cut into quarters peaches enough to fill the dish, heating them. Cover with a teaspoonful of sugar, half a teaspoonful of ground cinnamon and the juice of a half a lemon. Cover the dish with a thick, rich pie crust, put the dish in the oven, and bake very slowly until the crust is a rich dark brown. When it is baked take a silver spoon and break the top crust into pieces, letting some of them mix with the fruit. This "pie" may be served in any bowl, but it is better cold with whipped cream.

A gloom was suddenly cast over gay Port Stanley yesterday by the death by drowning of one of the most popular young ladies among the sojourners at Liberty Hill. Miss Edna Butler, eldest daughter of Mr. Francis H. Butler, the well known broker, of this city, was seized with cramps while in the lake bathing, and sank under the water. Although speedily rescued, all efforts to restore consciousness were unavailing.

Mrs. Butler and family have been summering at a cottage on Liberty Hill, which is but a short distance east of the pier. The family of Mr. J. A. Robinson, barrister, of St. Thomas, who are here for a summer, were yesterday afternoon about 4:30 o'clock, when Edna and Miss Winnie Robinson, who were bathing in the lake, were seen together in front of the bath house at the foot of the hill. The beach at this point is shallow for a considerable distance, but towards the east, the bottom deepens much nearer shore. The young ladies had been in the water for about fifteen minutes, not far from shore, when Edna and Geraldine ventured out to a considerable distance, and were seen to be struggling in the water.

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Labor Day Picnic.

Enjoyable Outing of London's Labor Organizations.

Large and Happy Crowd at Popular Port Stanley.

An Ideal Day—Excellent Programme of Sports and Good Music on the Hill—Baseball on the Beach—The Committee.

The united picnic at Port Stanley yesterday of the various labor organizations of the city was participated in by between 3,000 and 4,000, and proved one of the happiest of the many large gatherings there this season. Workmen, with their families, made merry, free from the fatigues and exertions of their daily tasks. "Old Probs" must have been very kindly disposed, for the day was an ideal one, and the success of the outing on the heights was largely due to the weather man's evident partiality.

Fourteen well-filled coaches composed the train that pulled out from London at 10:05 a.m., and four trains followed later in the day. There were eight coaches on the special at 1:15, ten at 2:30, seven at 3:25 and five at 7:25, and almost all crowded. Among the unions represented were: Cigar-makers, B. of K. T., Engineers, Firemen and Conductors, Metal Polers and Buffers, Bricklayers and Masons, Carpenters, Amalgamated Engineers, Industrial Brotherhood, Printers, Coopers, General Laborers, Telegraphers, Plumbers, Tailors, Molders, Painters and Building Laborers. The Tailors' Union of St. Thomas was also present in large numbers.

The crowd was in high spirits at the picnic ground, and seldom is there a more cheerful, amiable and essential as the old resort. Although not bound by the tie of nationality, the universal sound of labor made each feel an interest in his fellow, and all realized that the day was "Labor's Day." The time was passed in true picnic style. All day long the Seventh Band, of this city, under the direction of Roselle Pococke, and the Twenty-fifth Battalion Band, of St. Thomas, furnished excellent music.
