His father, Dr. Saunders, who is director there, has found the work interesting, and needing more attention so that Mr. C. E. Saunders is practically assistant director. His work consists chiefly of the experimental work. This is not the last summer the department of agriculture had him engaged taking photographs from one end of Canada to the other for the St. Louis Fair next year.

LONDON TOWNSHIP WEDDING.

Mr. Emmanuel Westlake son of Mr. George Westlake, and Miss Myrtle Maud, daughter of Mr. Willard Smith, both of London Township, were quietly married Wednesday afternoon. The event took place at the home of the bride's father, on the seventh anniversary of the wedding. The ceremony was conducted by Rev. Mr. Wardell, the bridesmaid being Miss Maude Parkinson, of this city, and the groomsmen being Mr. Smith, brother of the groom. Only the relatives of the two parties were present at the wedding and at the breakfast that was served afterwards. Mr. and Mrs. Westlake will leave for Alberta, where they intend making their home.

MARRIED AT ST. MARY'S CHURCH.

Mr. Frank Murphy, a G. T. R. conductor, of Stratford, was married at St. Mary's Church, the other morning, to Miss Kate A. Loughane, eldest daughter of the late Patrick Loughane, a well-known contractor. Mr. Murphy, brother of the bride, was groomsmen, and Miss Baker, niece of the bride, was bridesmaid. The bride was given away by Mr. Frank Loughane. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Father McKee, rector of St. Mary's Church. DEATH OF WILLIAM PORTER.

The death is announced of Mr. Frederick William Porter, of 112 Wellington street. Mr. Porter passed away yesterday, after a long illness, at his home, having reached the advanced age of 68 years, 20 of which were spent in London. He was a native of Canada, a well-known contractor by trade, and for many years was in business on the Wellington road, South London. He also identified himself with the Manchester Unity of Oddfellows, and was one of the oldest members of the order in the city. Besides his wife, he is survived by a son, Mr. Alfred Porter, of Detroit, and a daughter, Mrs. R. F. Bower, of Chicago. The funeral will be held to Mount Pleasant Cemetery on Sunday, Rev. R. D. Hamilton, of the Wellington Street Methodist Church, officiating.

YOUNG WOMAN FRIGHTENED.

Returning Wednesday evening from the evangelistic services at Dundas Street Methodist Church, a young lady living in the east end asserts that she was assaulted on Queen's avenue. She is a domestic, and works in the neighborhood of where she says someone struck her. That is, between Maitland and William streets. INTERRED AT WOODLAND

Burial of the Late Robert Shaw-Wood, of Woodholm.

Funeral was Very Largely Attended by Friends of the Family.

The remains of the late Mr. R. Shaw-Wood, of London township, were laid away this morning in the family vault at Woodland Cemetery beside those of Mrs. Shaw-Wood, who died a few years ago.

The funeral was held from Woodholm, and the attendance was an evidence of the respect in which Mr. Shaw-Wood was held not only in the city and London township, but in other parts of the province. The people of the surrounding country were present in large numbers, while not a few from the city and outside points followed the remains to the graves. The cortege proceeded from the country seat to the Church of the Holy Trinity, Hyde Park, where the impressive service of the Church of England was conducted by the Bishop of Huron, assisted by Rev. Dean Innes. The church was draped for the occasion, Mr. Shaw-Wood having been one of the leading members since its erection, and also one of the chief contributors to its work. The home of Mr. Shaw-Wood was draped, and as a mark of respect the people of the family at St. Paul's Cathedral was also draped in black.

The pall-bearers were chosen from the friends of the family. They were: Dr. Beattie Nesbitt, M. P. of Toronto; Mr. G. T. Lightfoot, of Buffalo; Col. Young, Dr. John D. Wilson, Mr. Campbell Becher, and C. J. A. Lefroy, of this city. The East Middlesex Conservative Association, of which Mr. Shaw-Wood was the respected president for some years, was represented in the cortege by the executive committee, but there were many of the other members also in attendance. The Conservative Club of this city was well-represented. Mr. Shaw-Wood having been actively identified with it during its existence. The floral tributes were numerous and of handsome design. They were sent by friends in many parts, and the organizations with which Mr. Shaw-Wood had been connected. Messages of condolence were also received from the friends of the family.

DEATH AT THE JAIL

Aged French Inmate Dies—Customary Inquest Was Held.

A death occurred at the county jail Wednesday, and according to law an inquest was held yesterday morning. The old man who died was a Frenchman, Maxim Seigneux, who had been there some time awaiting transfer to the asylum, he being insane. Death was due to old age.

The inquest was called by Coroner Ferguson at 12:15 noon today. The jurors sworn in were the following: Messrs. S. B. Gorvill (foreman), Geo. Dickie, C. Rydall, R. Cole, E. Dickie, S. Loveless, Alf Clark, A. F. McLeod, Charles Johns, James Clarke and W. J. Element.

Jail Physician McArthur testified that the deceased, who was about 90 years of age, had received proper care

and had died of natural causes. Governor Boston, the night watchman and the turnkey also gave evidence that the deceased had received proper attention.

The verdict was returned that "deceased came to death, April 17, 1903, from natural causes incident upon old age."

FOREMEN TO BE EMPLOYED ONLY DURING PART OF YEAR

The board doesn't want them When They're Not Needed.

Several Petitions for Local Improvements Granted.

The board of works occupied enough time last night at its regular meeting to have transacted an unusual amount of business. As a matter of fact some business was transacted, but it was very little. The question of ward foremen, the replanking of bridges and the granting of a few petitions comprising the transactions of a session lasting until after 10 o'clock. There were present Ald. Wyatt (chairman), Ald. Abram, Cooper and Gerry, Engineer Graydon and Secord, walks, sufficient to sign, were read. They were for: South Nelson, between Maitland and Colborne; north Lorne, between Colborne and Wellington; south Simcoe, and Wellington streets; south Clarence, between Oxford and St. James streets; between Adelaide street and Horton, between Adelaide street and addition, between Wellington and Waterloo streets. The requests were granted.

Petitions for cement walks, sufficiently signed, were for: West Maitland, between Regina and Piccadilly streets; north Grey, between Clarence and Wellington streets; south Simcoe, and Wellington streets; south Nelson, between Maitland and Colborne; between Oxford and St. James streets; between Adelaide street and Horton, between Adelaide street and addition, between Wellington and Waterloo streets. The requests were granted.

Messrs. T. B. Escott & Co. petitioned for a bituminous macadam pavement on York street, from Richmond street to Talbot street. The petition was granted.

A communication from Engineer Graydon was received recommending the replanking of a cement walk on the west side of Richmond street, between Albert and Kent streets. He also recommended a cement walk on the south side of York street, between Clarence and a point 200 feet east of the east limit of Richmond street. The engineer recommended that the cement walk be laid on the west side of Richmond street from Albert street to Central avenue, and if any of the rate-

holders petitioned against it that a plank walk be laid, and the whole cost be charged to the people there. The recommendations were approved by the committee.

It was decided that if the street railway made application to lay scoria track or stone set inside and outside of their rails they be granted power to do so.

There was some hesitation in recommending the payment of an account from William Malloch & Co. for repairs to steam roller. Though they considered the price exorbitant, they had nothing to do, they thought, but pay the account, as it has been certified to by Engineer Borbridge.

A motion made by Ald. Cooper was carried. It was to the effect that the tender of Morris Inwood for replanking the York, Oxford and Victoria bridges for \$1725 be accepted, provided he agrees to complete the work by June 15, otherwise that the tender of William Howie, jun., according to specifications for \$2175, be accepted.

Ald. Cooper had first moved the same thing with the exception that the cost was to be \$1000 more. Hence, it was decided to extend the time.

The matter of appointing ward foremen aroused some discussion. It was thought the foremen did not do enough work themselves and the chairman expressed the view that there was no sense in keeping men around when there was no work. A motion, therefore, carried that the ward foremen be engaged from April 1 to Nov. 1, and after that only when absolutely necessary.

On the motion being made to give the engineer power to appoint a foreman in the place of Foreman Evans, resigned, and also a sewer foreman, Ald. Cooper had some amusing argument with the city engineer. He wanted the new foreman to be the sewer foreman as well as ward foreman, thus saving the keeping of one man. This, however, the engineer assured the committee would not do, and after many explanations, relevant and irrelevant, Ald. Cooper consented to the motion passing as it was.
