

CARADOC. Council met at town hall, Mount Brydges, on Monday, Feb. 10, at 10 a.m., members all present. Minutes of pre-vious meeting and special meeting read, approved and signed. Moved by S. Oakes, seconded by Oliver Monger, that the reeve and clerk sign the petition presented by M. F. Ainslie, clerk of Blenheim, petitioning the Legislative Assembly to so amend the county councils act that the reeves of the municipalities will constitute the county councils. Carried. The auditors' report for 1901 was read and adopted, and the clerk instructed to have 200 copies printed for distribution. Moved by C. Fisher, seconded by W. 


