**Wretches Are Accused of Conducting a Horrible Traffic in the Illinois City.** Chicago, Feb. 19.—Girls are sold into slavery in Chicago for \$5 each, and royalty of from \$10 to \$15 a week, according to Jennie Neumann, 17 years old. She claims to have been a victim of this traffic. Her story was told to Justice Bradwell, who issued warrants for Hyman Rheinberg. Jennie declares Rheinberg sold her to May Baker, 40 Franklin street, and the latter has been placed under bonds for appearance in court.

**TALKED OF THE REFERENDUM**

Addresses by Rev. D. S. Hamilton and Mr. Frederic Daly.

Public Meeting Under the Auspices of the Royal Templars of Temperance.

A public meeting was held last night at Somerset Hall under the auspices of the Royal Templars of Temperance. There was only a small audience present, due no doubt to the disagreeable state of the elements in the early portion of the evening. The chief feature of the meeting was an address by Rev. D. S. Hamilton, pastor of the First Congregational Church, in which he discussed the liquor act and the referendum. The chairman, Mr. Fred Daly, also expressed clearly his views on the question.

Chairman Daly, in his opening remarks, said that prohibition some time ago ceased to be an academic question and had become a political and a party question, it having been virtually adopted by the Liberal party, through the promises of Sir Oliver Mowat, Mr. Hardy and Mr. Ross, and by adoption in the Liberal convention in 1883. Mr. Daly disapproved of the referendum because it was loaded down with so many disadvantages and distracting provisions. It was too complicated, and temperance people should ask the government to withdraw it. If the temperance people have no leader—no Joshua to lead them into the Promised Land—the speaker was in favor of remaining in the wilderness a few more years. If they could not have a leader, they should be content with a referendum. It would be useless to accept the referendum, for it could only result in defeat.

Mr. Hamilton, in an address which lasted about three-quarters of an hour, said that the liquor traffic is in danger because it is a dangerous devil's work and should be destroyed. Ranged with the liquor men are found financiers who oppose prohibition because of the economic changes which it would bring. Their opposition is based on the sordid soulless greed for money, and they should not be taken as experts on the question of prohibition. The opinion of the man who handles the Bible on a financial question will be least valuable as the opinion on a moral question of the man who handles beer. Because the traffic had been legalized in the past is no reason why the government should remain a partner in a disreputable business. The liquor traffic, he said, had done more to show the government a sample of the product of this cherished industry.

The speaker said he could not help saying that Principal Grant's feeling sentiments that could be quoted with approval by the liquor men, has shown himself to be a dangerous man to give advice to the youth of the country. Principal Grant talked of the men of moderate views, and made a claim that they were the ones who had done most for temperance. The moderates had even advised cooperation with the more respectable element of the liquor traffic, but said that they will be paid for their services. A great effort should be made to arouse them to see eye to eye with the temperance people.

Those who recognize the evil and who have been fighting for its overthrow can be counted upon to throw their efforts into the prohibition, whatever be the result of the referendum. The fight will be kept up till the goal is won.

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The question of compensation was touched upon by Mr. Hamilton. If compensation was contemplated, it should be submitted to the people with the referendum. Who were the people
