Every dog in England has to pay an annual tax, which amounts to seven shillings and six pence a year. Free from this tax are, however, all dogs of less than six months of age, as well as shepherd and butchers' dogs, According to official returns, there were last year 1,871,619 dogs in England paying this tax, which mean a total revenue for the Government of about \$3,500,000. The city of London alone had 153,567 tax-paying dogs.
