SCHOOL TEACHERS HEARTILY IN ACCORD WITH THE EMPIRE IDEA

Good Results Are Obtained From the Correspondence League—New Letters.

Correspondence between the school children of different parts of the empire, through the efforts of the Daughters of the Empire, continues to grow in volume and interest to those who belong to the correspondence league. On several occasions letters received by the youth of London have been published, as well as an outline of the scheme and its objects. As previously stated, the object of the correspondence league is to awaken interest among the school children in things pertaining to other parts of the empire, by putting them into touch with persons there, and giving them personal interest. From a Canadian standpoint another object is to spread the gospel of "Canada," and from all accounts the method is working well. The efforts of the league have been explained, to pair "pensive" correspondents, giving a boy another boy and a girl another girl, to correspond with, according as far as possible with their desires to the country that interests them the most. The center of it all is London, England, but the secretary of the Canadian branch is Mrs. Bapty, of this city, who is desirous of having the number of correspondents increased.

A noteworthy feature of the scheme that is gratifying to this country, especially, is that a very large number of the British and other colonial children express a desire to correspond with

someone in Canada, and as far as possible the Canadian committee is meeting the demand of the leaguers in their parts of the empire.

Letters from correspondents in South Africa, Australia and Great Britain have already appeared. One of the letters from a boy at King's Life Guards, Whitehall, England, tells of one told of how they had at that place a regiment called the King's Colonials, all colonial-born. Then when the London boy replied he asked, evidently, about the King's Colonials, and the English correspondent favored him with the following interesting information: The first battalion is at Edinburgh, the second at Umballa, Punjab; and the third at Perth. Some of the battalions were participated in were: Egypt, Mysore, Madras, Serampore, Natal, Nive, Orthes, Toulouse, Peninsular, Antioch, South Africa, Alma, Sebastopol, Lucknow, Ashantee, Egypt, Tel-el-Kebir, Nile and Kiribek. "So you see," he says, "they have done plenty of fighting."

How many boys here walk five miles to school? This is what one of the Scottish boys who writes to a London comrade does. He lives five miles from the Berwickshire High School, and he walks the distance every day. His letter is a boyish one, full of narrative in regard to the sports at his school. This is a phase of the correspondence that pleases the boys very much. Numbers of the letters from distant places express gratification at having heard from their Canadian friends how boys in this country spend their holidays, and many are the expressions of a desire to visit Canada. The subject seems to be mutually interesting and is instructive.

One boy writes from Leith, Scotland, in a hand that is surprisingly good. Although he says he is but 12 years of age, his letter is the first one, and, of course, only introductory, but the English and wing are much better than that of the average boy of that age, either here or in Great Britain.

From far-off Australia is a letter dated from a young girl to another in this city, and it is interesting both from the nature of its contents and the manner in which it is written. It shows the writer is a cultured girl. She says her London correspondent lives in a country that she is very much interested in, so she asks the young lady of this city to tell her all about Canada. Among other things this particular correspondent tells her she thinks the empire league idea such a good one, and that the empire idea is a good one, there is no doubt. Mrs. Bapty is constantly receiving letters approving of the scheme, and among others some interesting ones from teachers, who believe the system is doing a great deal among their pupils to impress geographical lessons and other knowledge, as well as implant patriotic sentiment.

One teacher recently heard from a boy who was devoting Friday afternoons to the reading of letters received from other parts of the globe, and the incentive to get letters likewise creates a desire to write them. The composition that is demanded each week is made up for by a letter, so that the boy or girl who receives a letter and reads it to the class is exempt from the necessity of writing a composition.

Many teachers have testified to the excellent results that have come from the Empire League, and are recommending the children to secure a correspondence letter. One of the public school inspectors to endorse the scheme is Mr. D. A. Maxwell, of Windsor, who recently issued a circular to the teachers of Essex in reference to the literature for continuation classes during the present year. In this

he places, among the purposes—to impress upon pupils the dominant claims upon their patriotism of British and especially of Canadian literature, of which the masses are almost entirely ignorant, because of the extensive use of American magazines, journals, etc., in which there is scarcely a reference to Canadian literature and less frequently a shadow of an expression of appreciation of it. The inspector speaks at length on the need of patriotism and in a recent letter commends the plan of the Empire League.

The Daughters of the Empire are doing a good work in offering prizes for essays, but they are probably laying the foundation for more far-reaching results from a national as well as individual standpoint in encouraging the interchange of letters among the Empire's subjects in the schools throughout the British dominions.

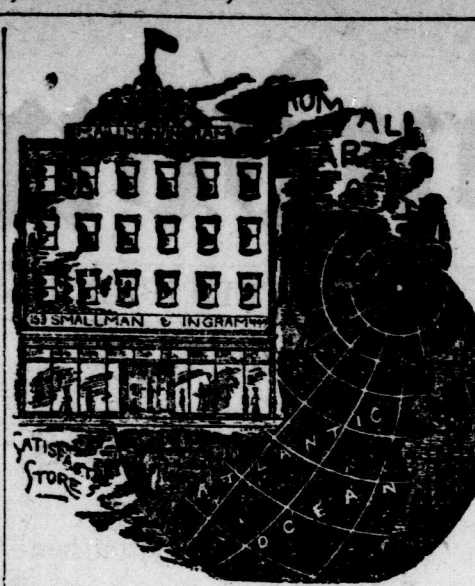
