THE TRADE REVIEW

Business Fairly Active Throughout the Dominion.

Toronto, April 23.—Bradstreet's weekly Canadian trade review shows that trade in wholesale circles at Montreal is showing a little more activity. Large shipments are being made to eastern and western points. Continued warm spring weather is needed to stimulate the demand for seasonal goods. Large quantities of freight are arriving for shipment.

The disastrous fire at Toronto this week has greatly unsettled the trade situation in this city. It will be many weeks before claims can be adjusted and arrangements made for continuing operations. Spring business is now fairly active.

At Quebec little change is perceptible in general trade from that of the preceding week. The backwardness of the season has been against the demand for seasonal wear. Navigation for below ports is about two weeks behind.

At Victoria and Vancouver wholesale trade is improving. The various industries, lumber and others are fairly active, and look for good results this season. The demand for goods from the Yukon is improving.

In Winnipeg trade is improving again after the snowstorms of last week. The buying by the retailers throughout the west is now active, and all look for a larger turnover this year.

London wholesale trade is getting more active. The country roads are not in very good condition, but the purchases by the retailers in anticipation of more activity in business later on, is now fairly active. The outlook for business is good.

There has been a steady improvement in some departments of trade at Ottawa the past week, and there is a more confident feeling among the wholesale trade as to the immediate future.

REV. W. J. CLARK'S IDEAL VESTRY

Fitting Tribute to a Popular Pastor and to His Friends' Good Judgment.

Probably as handsome and as tastefully furnished a vestry as is to be found in any church in Canada is that in the First Presbyterian Church in this city. Rev. W. J. Clark, the pastor, is very dear to his congregation, just as he is very much respected and revered by all creeds and classes in London. When the new school room was added to the First Presbyterian Church some time ago, the Ladies Aid Society determined to show their appreciation of the worth of the pastor in a tangible manner, and after much deliberation means were gone into it was agreed to furnish a vestry for him which should be second to none in Canada. With Mrs. Clark's congregation the best they can give him is in their estimation but poor indeed.

A committee was appointed to carry out the plans of the ladies, composed of Mrs. John Cameron, convenor; Mrs. (Judge) Macbeth, Mrs. C. W. Leonard and Mrs. (Rev.) Clark. How well these ladies succeeded the vestry bears ample testimony.

The walls of the vestry are paneled and finished in the Flemish oak, to a height of about five feet. Above this, the walls are covered by a handsome light-colored paper, rather plain and severe, but giving an ecclesiastical appearance that is appropriate.

At the west side of the vestry is a handsome red tile fireplace, with wrought iron fire dogs and a brass grate. The furniture is also of Flemish oak, to match the room, and is of a design of centuries long since lost sight of in the misty past. There is a settee, rich in its plainness and severity; a Morris chair and an easy chair and a table. Nothing more appropriate than the furnishings could possibly be conceived, and it is a tribute to the taste of the committee who purchased it.

On the walls are hung pictures of Rev. William Proudfoot, who organized the First Presbyterian Church in January, 1833, and who was its pastor until 1881. Then there is a picture of this city a year or so ago. On another wall hangs a picture of the aged Andrew Denholm, who was sexton of the First Presbyterian Church for 37 years, and who died some years ago. Besides these pictures, there is a beautiful landscape, and a handsome bronze mirror is also set into one of the walls. All the pictures are framed in oak to match the room. The floor is covered by a rich rug. As well as having a fireplace the room is heated by steam, and there are also electric lights in the wall to summon the choir.

In short the vestry of the First Presbyterian Church is an ideal vestry, one which is a credit to the church and to the ladies who furnished it, and to the pastor for whom it was provided.

FIGHTING CONSUMPTION

Prevention of Tuberculosis Discussed in Convention at Ottawa.

Ottawa, April 23.—At the convention of the Dominion Association for the Prevention of Tuberculosis, the reports of the committees were presented at the concluding session of the meeting. Dr. Bryce read the recommendations of the committee upon the relation of the Government to the crusade against consumption in man and domestic animals, and the duties of municipalities and on sanitary joined forces and sent in only one statement of the local boards of health regarding the placing of tuberculosis upon the contagious diseases list. It recommended the systematic inspection of meat, milk and public dairies, and the immediate attention to cases of consumption noticed by the medical health officers. The Bishop of Ottawa read a report of the educational committee, which recommended that the Dominion Government be asked to continue its annual grants as a means of dissemination of literature. The matter of appointing three delegates to the international congress upon the prevention of consumption, to be held in St. Louis in October, was referred to the executive committee.

COWAN DEFENDS THE FUSILIERS

Objects to Criticism of Corps That May Go to the St. Louis Fair.

Ottawa, April 22.—In the Commons today when the orders of the day were called, Mr. Cowan read the following extract from the Ottawa Citizen: "The Essex Fusiliers are to represent the Canadian militia at the St. Louis Exposition. The Fusiliers are a fairly good regiment, but they are not exactly the class of troops to be put on exhibition before the world as a representative Canadian corps."

Mr. Cowan went on to say that he did not think a more representative or capable corps could be sent. He objected to the harsh criticism he had just quoted. He considered the Essex Fusiliers second to none. When President Roosevelt was in Detroit last year the regiment had crossed the river to participate in the parade and review and the opinion of the Americans was that the Canadians were the equal of any regiment in the States.

Mr. Clarke agreed with Mr. Cowan and asked if the regiment had been

selected to go to St. Louis as reported. "No regiment, so far as I know, has been selected to go there," the Minister of Militia replied.

"So there is nothing in it," a member observed, and the matter dropped. Mr. Cowan introduced a measure for the amendment of the joint stock companies' act. The bill enables a company, by bylaws, to increase its shares to \$100, which cannot, now be done, although shares can be reduced to \$100 if the par value is above that sum. A measure to amend the criminal code of Nova Scotia was introduced by Mr. Wade. It provides for a speedier conviction of those found in illegal possession of gold quartz and amalgam.

Mr. Lennox introduced a bill to amend the railway act, and Mr. Prefontaine a bill to amend the fisheries act. Both were read a first time.

This measure bears on whale fishing and places the regulating of the industry in the hands of the Minister of Marine.

The measure of Mr. Fitzpatrick to amend the exchequer court act was given its third reading. Its purpose is to give the Government the right to appeal from exchequer court decisions in all cases. At present there is an appeal only from judgments for over \$500.

The second reading of the G. T. P. measure was called, but owing to Mr. Borden's objection that the bill had not been distributed, the Premier withdrew the motion to proceed. It will be taken up on Tuesday.

The House then went into committee of supply and after discussion of the customs estimates adjourned at 1:45 a.m. until Monday afternoon.

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
