

St. Petersburg, May 28. - Capt. Jakovliff, former commander of the Russian battleship Petropavlovsk, who was wounded when his ship was destroved at Port Arthur on April 13, in an interview regarding the possibility of the Japanese capturing Port Arthur, declared that it would take 150,000 men, with magnificent artillery, to accomplish the task. The blow has been a heavy one, as the position lost was of great value, strategically. Added to this, it is claimed by the victors that fifty cannon were taken. 
