BOXING AND FENCING.

CATTLE SOLD RAPIDLY
Forty-Two Head "Knocked Down"
In Thirty-Five Minutes.

One of the most successful sales that
has been held in the township of Caradoc
for some time took place yesterday
at Mr. D. J. Donaldson's, Longwood
road. As Mr. Donaldson has sold his
farm, everything was disposed of. The
sale was conducted by Auctioneer A.
M. Hunt, assisted by Mr. Brock, of
Strathroy. Prices were good, and bid-
ding lively. Forty-two head of cattle
were sold by Mr. Hunt in 35 minutes.
Six cows averaged \$45; twelve 2-year-
old steers, \$40; fourteen yearlings, \$25,
and others accordingly. A 2-year-old
cow brought \$127, and a yearling \$100.
Oats sold for 30 cents per bushel. The
sale amounted in all to about \$2,700.
Mr. Donaldson does not give up pos-
session of his farm until spring.

BIG GROWTH HAD THE FOURTH WARD

Assessment Jumps \$345,000—
The Population Shows an
Increase of 558.

The assessment figures for the fourth
ward for 1906 have been compiled by As-
sessment Commissioner Grant.
The statement shows that the ward
has made a very satisfactory growth
during the past twelve months. The
total assessment for the year is \$4,679,-
855, whereas the assessment made last
year for 1905 taxes amounted to only
\$4,335,562, or an increase of \$344,293.
In the matter of population the ward
also was shown to be 11,964. This year
it is 12,522, an increase of 558.

The assessment is divided as fol-
lows:
Real property 1904. 1905.
Personal property \$4,212,532 \$4,449,211
Taxable income 93,850 113,021
The increase on the assessment made
this year are as follows: Real property
\$226,679, personal assessment \$191,711,
taxable income \$88,442.

The advances made by the fourth
ward are far greater than those of the
first and second wards. The returns for
the third ward will be completed early
next week.

TO FIGHT WHITE
PLAGUE IN LONDON

Branch of Society Formed for
That Purpose—Rev. Dr.
Moore's Lecture.

Rev. Dr. Moore, the secretary of the
Society for the Prevention of Tuber-
culosis, delivered a lecture in the city
hall last night, and afterwards organ-
ized a branch of the society to carry
on the work in this city. Mayor Cam-
pell presided.

Dr. Moore gave a description of the
different forms of consumption and
their cure. He emphatically declared
that all forms of the disease were pre-
ventable. Smallpox was a scourge at
one time, and now the death rate from
that disease was very small indeed.
The people had been educated.
The proper methods of dealing with the
disease, and now they were practically
immune from it. The great need
in dealing with consumption was to
educate people in the proper methods
of prevention.

Only by two methods could the dis-
ease be transmitted: by the sputum
and by eating diseased meat or drink-
ing milk from diseased cows. While
this latter was important, the danger
was not so great, as there were very
few tubercular cattle in this country.
The chief form of contagion was from
the sputum. Were some proper method
found of getting rid of the sputum,
there would be very little danger from
the disease.

The aim of the society was to place
a sputa cup in the hands of every con-
sumptive. By this method the danger
of the communication of the disease
would be reduced to a minimum. Con-
sumption was clearly preventable by
this method. Clean streets and clean
homes, especially the homes where the
disease was, would lessen the danger
considerably.

The following committee was ap-
pointed to represent the society here:
Messrs. Colin MacCallum, J. H. Mc-
Mechan, J. N. Bryant, W. T. Ham-
ilton, Dr. Roome, Dr. Arnot, Dr. H. A.
Stevenson.

The society here intends to employ a
competent nurse to visit the homes af-
flicted with the disease to instruct
them in the best methods of improving
their condition and preventing con-
tagion. They also intend placing a sputa
cup in the hands of each of the 300
consumptives in the city, and thus de-
stroy the active cause of the disease.

A sanatorium will also be erected as
soon as the society can collect funds for
the purpose. An active canvass for
funds will be commenced at once. The
institution will be chiefly for con-
sumptives of the third degree—the in-
curable class.

KAISER MAY HAVE A TRY
Rumor That He Will Challenge for
the America's Cup.

New York, Oct. 4.—Something is do-
ing about the America's cup and it is
the opinion of many well informed
yachtsmen that a challenge will come
soon from some club on the other side
of the water.

There has been lots of talk
about the famous old cup for some
time and several names have been
mentioned as possible challengers. But
at this season of the year there are al-
ways reports of challenges.

It has been an open secret for some
time that the German Emperor has had
covetous eyes on the Blue Ribbon of
the Sea. He has for some years been
building a navy, becoming the construc-
tion of merchant vessels and talking a
great interest in yachting. He has care-
fully followed the racing in this coun-
try, and it is not surprising that he has
it said that he is thoroughly familiar
with all the models of famous boats
that have been produced by the best
designers in the world.

Now some yachtsmen think that a
challenge is coming from the Kaiser-
licher Yacht Club and that it will name
a boat owned by the German Emperor
as its representative. These yachts-
men are men well posted in club af-
fairs.

Yachtsmen who have been on the
other side this summer have returned
recently with rumors of coming chal-
lenges, and from the way they have
talked it would seem that they know
more than they care to express. Com-
mander Hebbinghaus, the naval at-
tache at the German embassy in
Washington, said: "It is understood in
Germany that the Emperor will be an-
other challenger for the America's cup
next year." He gave that as a reason why
the Emperor would not offer another
