Mr. Maclean—The Minister of Justice, as Mr. Charles Fitzpatrick and the Right Honorable Premier, as Sir Wilfrid Laurier, with 40 of their colleagues, made representations to the Holy See to send this delegate to Canada. The statement is not denied.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier—The honorable gentleman can read the petition itself. This petition of the Catholic members was read in this House.

to such depths of political infamy as it is being dragged down into by the Toronto News, the Toronto World, Dr. Sproule and Col. Sam Hughes. Mr. Bourassa declared his willingness to accept Mr. Maclean's challenge and meet him upon any platform in Ontario. As for the presence of a representative of the Pope in Canada, he would remind Mr. Maclean and Col. Hughes that the Government of Great Britain did not hesitate to avail itself of the good offices of the Pope in pacifying the church people and even the Orangemen of Ulster—that small section of the British Empire from which Mr. Maclean and Col. Hughes came, did not raise any cry of dissent. Mr. Bourassa went on to say that as one of the Liberal members who had signed the request to the Pope to have a papal legate sent to Canada, he was not ashamed of having done so. The reason was that they had been misled by the understanding between the clergy and the laity of Quebec in regard to a certain political question. Honorable gentlemen opposite are always talking about the priest-ridden people of Quebec; about the clerical domination under which Quebec and the majority of the Catholic people kept them in the facts of office. He was sorry that a party because as he said, having found that the fiscal policy had no influence, that the country had no confidence in them, and that they now thought there were enough people in this country to believe the old tales of two or three centuries ago about the gunpowder plot and the Guy Fawkes conspiracy, which today's poorest schoolmaster in England would be ashamed to mention except as a legend which existed in the times of credulity in that country. He held it to be an insult that these things should be resurrected against the Quebec hierarchy by the News, the Mail and the World, a team of which he could not say which was the silliest. Mr. Maclean and the World, by its cartoons, retards, and great clur on the Province of Ontario.

"If any constituency in Ontario should be open," said Mr. Bourassa, "I will be prepared to enter it, and unless Mr. Maclean and Col. Hughes with his men Turpin and the seventeen men who took Gen. De Villars' and let him slip off the next day—unless these men would come together I could not
