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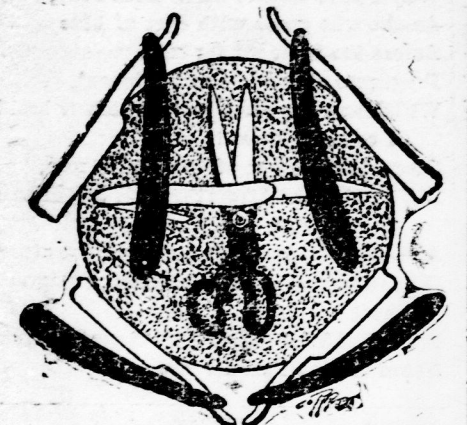

THIRTY-FIVE YEARS AGO

TODAY

[From The London Advertiser of Jan. 23, 1911.]

Yesterday and today we experienced some genuine Canadian winter weather. Early this morning the cold was intense, the thermometer ranging about ten degrees below zero.

The police took their new clothing into wear yesterday. Today the whole force was inspected by the commission, who appeared well pleased with its appearance, in the new uniform.

On Saturday evening the members of the London Typographical Union held their second anniversary supper at Rook's Terrace Restaurant. Mr. John Dewar, president of the union, occupied the chair, and Mr. Thomas Coffey, ex-president, the vice-chair. An excellent supper of oysters, roast turkey, and the necessary accompaniments, was served in Rook's best style.

Mr. Gladstone, as we learn by cablegram, has resigned his seat for Greenwich, in consequence of the dissatisfaction with his course expressed by his constituents. The sensitive feeling of the Premier of England is in marked contrast with that of the Premier of Canada.

A member of the Imperial Cabinet, it is said, will introduce a measure during the coming session of the English Parliament providing for vote by ballot. In a country like England, where social, proprietary and corporate influences are so powerful, the ballot is almost necessary to the untrammelled exercise of the franchise; and on the whole, we believe it would also considerably diminish electoral corruption.

He Didn't Know Thames; Thought It a Quiet Creek

Yankee Surprised at What the Old Fellow Can Do in a Pinch.

A genuine, dyed-in-the-wool Yankee dropped into The Advertiser editorial room yesterday, and as he had heard of the Thames being on a tear he began to ask questions about the stream, and what it was capable of doing in the way of floods. What made him inquisitive was the fact that he had himself been questioned on the subject, and he did not want to again have to play "green."

The Yankee was told that the Thames went on a rampage at least once a year, and that when it did the residents in some parts of the city spent sleepless nights. He was informed that the river had been known to raise eight feet, ten feet—yes, more, in a short space of time, and he looked thunderstruck.

Didn't Think It.

"Well, I'll be durned," he said, in real Yankee fashion, "who would have thought that of such a small stream as that. Never dreamed it could be possible."

"You know, I had an experience with a flood once that I won't soon forget. I was at a hotel down south over night—or at least, it was my intention to stop over night. I went to bed and fell asleep, but was aroused early in the morning by the hotelman hollering for every person to get out in a hurry, or they might not get out at all. Well, sir, do you know, that a river flowed right in front of our hotel, and that 'ere stream had riz about four feet in the few hours I slept. I didn't realize it was possible."

"And then to think that London has just such a stream. Why, when I first saw London, I thought it was a shame that it lacked water facilities. Struck me the river down there was nothing more than a creek, but to think of it being capable of doin' such things. It beats anything I ever heard of over in our country. I'll have to surprise the folks at home when I go back to see them."

And with that the Yankee left, shaking his head as if unable to realize that such things were true about the Thames.

Westerners Frightened.

Residents along the Thames, west of London, were very much concerned yesterday over the proportions assumed by the river, and during the day more than one inquiry came from interested ones as to the "probs," and whether the river was rising, falling, or remaining stationary.

One farmer living near Glencoe telephoned The Advertiser to ascertain the outlook up this way. He was interested to the extent that he had between 300 and 400 cords of wood piled on the bank, and he didn't want to see it go down the stream. The river was then so high that he did not feel at all easy, and if it was continuing to rise he would have to get busy and move the wood back to a place of safety.

He was told—that was at 11 o'clock—that there was seven feet of water going over the dam; that the stream had gone up five feet of water since Saturday morning, but that as the heavy rain had ceased and there was little or no snow left, the river would not likely rise further. However, during the remainder of the day it did swell more.

"Keep us posted in The Advertiser from day to day on the condition of the river," he said, as he was about to hang up the receiver. "We will watch for it down here, where many are concerned."

A REMARKABLE WOMAN.

Mind-reading has long been a recognized mental adjunct, possessed however, by few persons, and possibly for this reason the public knows little of the accomplishments from a scientific standpoint, of those who have labored in this particular field for years. Her reputation, however, does not rest entirely upon her ability to read the unspoken thought of others, but it is a most peculiar gift with which she is endowed that has been the subject of so much discussion and speculation the world over.

This gift is her power of locating things that have been lost, or locating missing persons and piercing the veil of the future. It is in her exhibition of "somnolency" that Miss Fay is said to surpass anything of its kind ever before attempted. While in a passive state, which is induced partially by auto-hypnotism, the clever little woman is enabled to read not only what her auditors may be thinking of, but their names, their occupation and so on, tell the lost things, money, jewelry, the bonds, or, in fact, anything that has been stolen, lost or mislaid.

THE HYGIENIC INSTITUTE

Promoters Meet to Formulate Their Proposals—Committee Chosen.

The attendance was made up of those who formed the deputation which went to Toronto in connection with the matter a few days ago, as well as a number of others.

After Mr. S. Sreaton had been chosen chairman and Ald. Matthews secretary, it was decided that the boards of trade, farmers' institutes and public in general should be asked to co-operate towards impressing upon the Government the desirability of having the institute in London.

On motion of Mayor Judd it was agreed to have a document drawn up in accordance with what London desires from the Government, and setting forth the advantages it will mean to outside places to have such an institute in London, available to all.

On motion of Dr. McMillan the meeting adjourned.
