Easter in the Churches of London
Splendid Music, Interesting Sermons

Bishop Williams' Impressive Sermon in St. Paul's—Bishop McEvay in St. Peter's.

Notwithstanding that Easter Sunday was not nearly as bright or pleasant a day as Good Friday, every church in the city had one of the largest congregations of the year.

All the churches had decorations appropriate to the season, many of them being most beautifully adorned with large Easter lilies and sprays.

In every church, too, there was special Easter music, and some really splendid programmes of sacred music were rendered.

St. Paul's Cathedral presented a very beautiful appearance yesterday. The handsome new font erected in memory of Dean Innes was profusely decorated with Easter lilies and ferns, while the reading desk and pulpit were banked with sprays and oleanders.

Bishop Williams preached to a very large congregation, taking his text from Psalm, iii, 3: "The bath sent redemption unto his people."

"All history bears out the statement that the people of that age lived in darkness as far as any hope of a future life was concerned," said his lordship, referring to the time of the text. "No one had ever had any proof of the resurrection, which the body of Christ had risen and appeared to his disciples and the women. Some people try to make out that because there are variations in the story as told in the different chapters, that it cannot be true."

"No two persons who were ever asked to tell a story will tell it in the same way," he said. "Take the well-known instance of the battle of Waterloo. Wellington declared that the battle started at 11 o'clock in the morning; Napoleon said it was at 12, and Marshal Ney had no doubt what ever that it was at 1 o'clock in the afternoon. But because these three men differed there is no doubt that the battle of Waterloo was fought."

"So it is with Christ. Because those who were with him tell the story of his resurrection in a different way, there is no doubt that he arose from the dead."

"The resurrection marks the difference between Christians of today and the people before Christ was crucified. He has conquered death, and we have a sure foundation laid, and are redeemed from all doubt."

"We are redeemed also from all sense of failure, for we have a sure foundation laid, and are redeemed from all doubt."

"It was the consciousness of this that enabled the Christian martyrs to undergo the severest tortures they did. However evil might triumph for the moment, they knew goodness was sure to win in the end. To outward appearances evil is triumphant in many places today. Never was the victory of good over evil more strongly shown than by the resurrection. It has redeemed us also from the tyrannical and hopeless power of death."

"Time was when no matter how much man might wish for immortality, they had seen no proofs of it. The same hopelessness is seen at present among the heathen and those who have not accepted Christ. To the individual the resurrection is the greatest uplifting influence. The same name must not be forever the same name, and the name of the county and province be given."

7. When a shipment is destined to a point beyond the line of the Canadian Pacific Railway which can be reached by more than one route, either rail or water, agents must be particular to have shippers specify by what route the goods are to be forwarded.

8. If freight is consigned to a point not reached by any railway line, shippers must specify the railway station to which delivery is required, and the route, or if destined to a place reached by a water line, the name of the railway station at which delivery is to be made to such water line.

The proper marking and addressing of freight is as much in their interest of the shipper as of the carrier. Neglect in the proper addressing of packages may result in the loss of mis-carriage of the goods.

Agents must see that these instructions are carried out.

While riding yesterday afternoon, Mr. E. Banks of this city, was badly injured by a fall from a horse. His shoulder blade was splintered and he was bruised badly. His injuries are very painful and will lay him up for some time.

Mr. Banks and a friend were riding along at a good stiff gallop, when the horse he was riding crossed its front legs, turning a somersault. Banks was thrown a considerable distance, alighting on his back.

His friend was following close behind, and the horse attempted to jump over Banks. It did not clear well, and Banks was struck on the right shoulder blade by the horse's hoofs, fracturing it.

Banks was taken home, and the bone set.

SUFFRAGISTS GET HOPE

Women Agitators Encouraged by Inauguration of New Ministry.

London, April 19.—The woman suffrage agitators have taken new hope of final triumph with the appointment of Herbert Henry Asquith to be Prime Minister.

Not that Mr. Asquith has himself been anything more than lukewarm in his espousal of the women's cause; nor that they have any reason to feel that Mrs. Asquith will exert her great influence for them. Their hope lies in the brilliant and scholarly young Mrs. Harold John Tennant, Mrs. Asquith's sister-in-law, who is devoted heart and soul to the cause of equal suffrage and has fought many of its battles, although so far she has refrained from any public demonstration that would be likely to land her in jail. It is well understood, however, that this has been only in deference to the wishes of her husband's family and because she has realized the possibility of what has just taken place, the coming in of an Asquith ministry.

Mrs. Tennant was one of his majesty's superintending inspectors of factories, a practical, brainy, enthusiastic working woman, when Harold John Tennant married her a few years ago. She was Margaret Edith Abraham, the daughter of Irish parents, who were educated by one of the most scholarly English women of the generation—Lady Dilke's sister.

Later she became Lady Dilke's private secretary and dispensed the large sums Lady Dilke spent every year to build up trades unions for girls and also to force the House of Commons to pass laws for the safety and protection of working women. Lady Dilke often said that Margaret Abraham had the finest mind she had ever encountered in a woman, and she took great pride in her protégée.

TO AID ADMIRALTY

Masters of Ships Will Report on War Vessels Encountered.

London, April 18.—The admiralty is inviting the co-operation of ship-owners in the direction of improving its naval intelligence department. The merchant skipper is to be called upon to assist by reporting every warship he meets, whether British or foreign.

The admiralty is supplying block sketches to shipmasters through ship-owners so that they may more easily identify any war vessel they encounter. Their duty will be to signal intelligence to any of his majesty's ships which they may pass on the high seas or to hand it over to the proper authorities at colonial or foreign ports.

At present probably the ship's captain does not care two straws whether they pass as long as they do not get in their way. There is to be nothing in the way of a fee or reward for this additional duty of the British shipmaster. He is expected to do it for love of country. Considering the great preponderance of British shipping, shipmasters have a splendid opportunity for acting as watchdogs in every part of the globe. At least it is considered desirable that they should familiarize themselves with the appearance, not only of the craft on whose assistance they might some day have to rely, but of those from which it might on occasion be necessary they should run away.

C. P. R. Rates Re Freight Shipments

The C. P. R. has issued the following circular re the marking and addressing of freight:

The attention of all concerned is again directed to the necessity of fully marking all freight.

1. Each package or piece of less than carload freight forwarded all rail, also each package or piece of carload and less than carload freight forwarded "lake and rail" must be plainly marked with the name or initials of the consignee and the destination in full, so as to insure prompt delivery, even if separated from the waybill.

2. Marks on packages should be compared with the bill of lading, and correction, if necessary, made by the shipper or his representative. Old marks must be removed or effaced.

3. Tags should not be used when the nature of the goods will permit of the address being stencilled on packages. If this be not possible, some distinguishing mark or brand must be placed upon the goods, and must be shown in the bill of lading. Agents must transfer such mark or brand to the waybill, which must describe the goods fully. For example, in the case of a shipment of canned goods, the

bill of lading, (and also the waybill) must show so many cases of tomatoes, so many cases of pears, so many cases of corn, etc., as well as the brand and the mark indicating the consignee and destination.

4. The marks on the packages must correspond with those shown in the bill of lading. For example, on a shipment to Winnipeg the packages must be marked "Winnipeg," and not some other destination for which the goods may be ultimately intended. If packages are intended for redistribution beyond, a special designating mark may be used for the guidance of those attending to the redistribution, but only the destination given in the bill of lading must be shown on the goods.

5. Frequently in connection with lake and rail shipments, there is on the same boat more than one consignee for one consignee. In order to prevent such consignments from becoming mixed, it will greatly facilitate their correct handling if shippers will also show on packages their name or trade mark. Consignments can then be delivered complete and errors avoided.

6. Freight consigned to a place of
