JOHNSON TO WORD

Chicago Theatre Gets Injunction
to Enforce Verbal Contract
With Jack.

CLAIMS HE FORGOT DATE

Champion Watches 'Jeffries' Growing
Corps of Trainers With Much
Interest.

Chicago, Dec. 31.—World's heavy-weight champion pugilist Jack Johnson appeared in a courtroom for the occasion, however, it was not a "pinch" for speeding his motor car that brought him there but an injunction issued by Judge Windes of the circuit court restraining the big black from appearing in any theatre in Chicago except the Alhambra during the week beginning Jan. 2.

The petition for the injunction was filed by David B. and Max Weber, owners of the theatre. They asserted that in November they entered into an agreement with Johnson whereby he was to appear at the theatre during the week of Dec. 29 at a salary of \$1,200. They also asserted that Johnson subsequently requested them to postpone the date of his appearance to the week of Jan. 2, which was agreed upon.

Loss of Money Alleged.

The bill also avers that Johnson after entering into the agreement, which was a verbal one, entered into another contract for an extended tour, including the week of Jan. 2, and refused absolutely to abide by the agreement entered into with the Weber brothers. The bill also sets forth that large sums of money have been spent in advertising purposes.

Was Little Concerned.

Johnson appeared in court with several friends, but was not represented by an attorney. The court advised that he could come in any time and make a motion to dissolve the writ if he showed proper grounds.

The champion showed little concern over the action of the court. Jack admitted he had entered into a verbal agreement with the owners of the theatre, but so long ago that it had entirely escaped his memory. He signed up for a tour of one night stands.

Most of the day was spent by the champion in testing films, which was the moving picture concern which will take pictures of the big fight. Jack realizes he ought to make a fortune out of the pictures and he intends to see that nothing is left of the picture part of the picture-taking apparatus.

Having had experience with the machines, Jack has a good idea of how things ought to be on the day of the battle, and he is going to put through several severe tests.

Goes to Logansport Tomorrow.

Johnson will leave tomorrow for Logansport, where he is booked for a one-night stand. He will not be back in Chicago until early in April, when he will start training at his home for the Jeffries battle. The tour on which Jack is about to start will take him in every large city in the east, ending in Boston.

Although the big battle is over six months off, Jack does not let a day pass without taking note of the latest events in the Jeffries camp. The champion is a close observer and sees deeper into things than most people give him credit for. Few people know that he used his own judgment in drawing the final articles for his fight with Jeff.

Jack Is No Dub.

Although his manager was present Jack did all the talking, and argued against points which Jeffries and his attorneys tried to have inserted in the articles which would result in their favor after the fight.

Johnson is interested in the corps of trainers which Jeffries is daily signing to assist him in training. "If fighters, trainers and athletes would win this fight, I am licked already," Jack said. "Why there's Corbett, Gatch, Attel, Rolter, Berger, McKelley, McCormick, Tommy, Ryan and a lot more who are sure to be seen in his camp. These men may help him in training, but they will not assist him much when he gets into the ring on Jan. 2. He is the man who will have to beat me and not the other fellows."

Won't Help "Jeff" in Ring.

"These men may be able to teach Jeff something, but I doubt whether they will be able to do any more for him to help get him into condition. I don't believe Jeff knows the game as thoroughly as any of the men mentioned, and will fight me with the same tactics with which he has fought me. I will ship and defend it against all comers until he is retired."

"If I am successful in this fight I hope the American people will give me the credit I believe will be due me. Since poor old Bob Fitzsimmons was defeated by Bill Lang in Australia last week, the story has gone around that Fitz was too old and that Jeff will suffer the same result. If these stories are true and if I succeed in winning from Jeffries, the people will say, 'He is a strong, husky fighter, while Jeffries was too old and has been out of the game too long.'"

"Jeffries must know I am no slouch and I intend to get myself in superb condition for this fight, and if he does beat me, Jack Johnson will not be going around making any excuses. All I want is a square deal and an unprejudiced opinion from the American people after the fight."

WANTS RULE CHANGED

Manager Griffith Would Keep Umpires Out of Way During Play.

Cincinnati, Dec. 31.—Manager Clark Griffith of the National League baseball club, says there is one rule relating to umpires which ought to be changed.

"I don't like to be called a kicker," said Griffith yesterday, "but it does seem to me that it is an umpire's business to stand around the field and keep the game going, and have him step into it and knock the whole business."

"Very often I have seen signals go wrong because an umpire was in the way, and the players could not see. I want them to stand on the outfield side of the base line and give their locations there, the other umpire remaining behind the catcher at all times. I think with this rule in force we could have a whole lot less wrangling than we have now, and the public would get a little better ball playing for their money."
