Catholics and the Bible.

To the Editor of The Advertiser: Sir,—May I trespass upon your time and space once again in relation to the above subject? In your issue of June 16 you kindly gave space to a letter of mine in which I called upon a Rev. A. E. White to give proof positive of the wholesale charge he made on the previous Sunday in the Talbot Street Baptist Church in this city, to the effect that the Catholic priests of Montreal and the province of Quebec go into the homes of the people and burn the Bibles they find therein. He did not say Catholic or Non-Catholic versions of the Bible. He said "they burn the Bibles they find." This Rev. Mr. White has not replied to my demand for proof positive beyond doubt or question. Of course, we know what he told the yarn. It was to draw money out of the pockets of his hearers to be used to buy the poorest of the poor among the Catholics of Montreal and other parts of the province of Quebec to attend Baptist meeting-houses.

Just one month ago, to the very day, a letter appeared in The Advertiser in reply to me—not from Mr. White, but from one who signs himself, "A. L. Therrien." Who is he? What position does he hold? What is the "evidence" he submits? Would any lawyer dare to present such evidence in any court unless such court was composed of very ignorant men? Is there a judge who would admit such testimony as evidence? I think not. A. L. T.'s letter is not worth the paper it is written on, or the printer's ink to print it. "Four women" told the Catholic priests that they don't want their names published. Why? They don't want the names of the priests published. Why? That is what I have asked for. These women tell these yarns to get some of the \$11,000 sent into Quebec to be used in the "conversion" of the poorest of the poor among the Catholics of that province? That is how "conversions" are made in the western provinces, to which \$28,000 were sent last year. And the same process is followed in Ireland, where the Irish Church Missions to the Roman Catholics. "Take my books. We will help you. Let me read to you. Let me pray here. Kneel down with me. Pray with me. Yes, let your soul to us. Deny your faith, and we will take care of your body."

This man says that these women, for no number of obvious reasons, do not want their names and those of the priests published. Ah! Smell a rat? They are afraid to tell the truth, why fear? The law will protect them. If these four women are not afraid to go to the Baptist place of worship and tell the priest and the professors, then we are told that in one of the Montreal churches a priest told his people, last fall, to burn all Bibles and Testaments bought by the Protestants and (Oh, what a bad, bad man!) he even went so far as to say, "Soak them in kerosene first."

How extravagant! What a terrible thing the priest and the church! That we are not told. Why?

A woman who heard this naughty priest say this, kept her Testament and is now a Baptist. We hear her name. If she was not afraid of the priest, if she had courage to turn Baptist, she ought to glory in her "conversion." How much? Besides, she is a Protestant. Which one of the seven Baptist sects did she join? Why did not the Testament lead that woman into the English Church, or Methodist, or one of the three Presbyterian bodies, or some one of the other 500 Christian sects? Why the Baptist?

Then this A. L. T.'s parents, "devout Catholics," and the Bishop of Montreal. Again, why? What other influence was made on behalf of the Baptists? But oh, these poor, benighted, ignorant Roman Catholics, we are told, do have Bibles, and the Psalms, and that wonderful book, "The Imitation of Christ." Oh, you naughty, wicked priests, to let your people read the grand, the beautiful, the uplifting, the sublime "Imitation of Christ!"

My dear A. L. Therrien, you have made out a very poor case. I have seen the King James authorized version of the Bible through twice. Once I plodded through it to cut out the number of times wine and strong drink are mentioned therein. Besides that I have read hundreds of passages in it, but it did not make a Baptist of me. I have read the "Douay" Bible all through, and have a very fine Scotland and Ireland, and the continent of Europe, in the United States to the south of us, and in this fair Dominion of ours, have come into the one true fold through the study of the Holy Scriptures. Strange! The priest I made my first confession to, at the age of 9 years, had been a Scotch minister. That was the Rev. R. G. McKillop, and Father Garde, one of the curates at the same church, had been a Church of England minister. That church was St. Mary's, Chelsea, near Old London. At the Oratory, Bloomsbury, I knew 30 priests who had been Protestant ministers, two had been lawyers, two had been officers in the army.
