DINNER. Clear Soup. Hamburg Steak. Potatoes. Onions Cottage Pudding. Cafe Noir.

Coffee Charlotte Russe-Half cupful of ot coffee, half cupful sugar, one cupful of milk, yolk of two eggs, two heaping tablespoonfuls of powdered gelatine, one cupful of whipped cream, two tablespoonfuls of powdered sugar, quarter teaspoonful of salt: some lady fingers. Scald the For the girl in her first 'teens or those about 10 and 12, the hair is waved milk with the half cupful of sugar; beat the egg yolks and add the powdered sugar, salt and hot milk. Stir over the fire until it thickens, then add the gelatine dissolved in the coffee. Strain and stir over ice until the mixture begins to betwixt and between period. When it is at this ugly length, too short to curl hicken, then fold in the whipped cream. Pour into a mold lined with lady fingers. Turn out when set.
