#### HEINIE'S HOMER WAS A LONGEST HIT IN LEAGUE

Ball Travelled 425 Feet Before Struck Top of Scoreboard

[Canadian Press.] Chicago, Aug. 29. — Heinie Zimmerman, third baseman for the Cubs, and leading latsman, in the National League, hit what is said to be the longest home run ever made on the grounds, in the game with Louis here yesterday. It was Zim-merman's fourteenth home run drive this season, and was made when one man was on base in the first inning.

The ball struck the lower left-hand corner of the scoreboard in left field, near the clubhouse, and experts on long drives estimated that the ball travelled 425 feet before striking the board. Several of the Chicago team declared the drive was the longest ever made in the National League.
