HEINIE'S HOMER WAS A LONGEST HIT IN LEAGUE

Ball Travelled 425 Feet Before II Struck Top of Scoreboard.

Chicago, Aug. 29. — Heinie Zimmer-man, third baseman for the Cubs, and leading Latsman, in the National League, hit what is said to be the longest home run ever made on the local grounds, in the game with St. Louis here yesterday. It was Zimmerman's fourteenth home run drive this season, and was made when one

man was on base in the first inning.

The ball struck the lower left-hand corner of the scoreboard in left field, near the clubhouse, and experts on long drives estimated that the ball travelled 425 feet before striking the board, Several of the Chicago team declared the drive was the longest ever made in the National League.
