ACCIDENT WAS DUE TO CARELESS WORKMAN

A Jury Investigated Death of Norman Kearns at Harrison.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Harrison, Dec. 12.—"We find from the evidence that the said Norman L. Kearns, while in the employ of the Bell Telephone Company, came to his death as the result of an electric shock by coming in contact with a live wire, and are of the opinion if said Norman L. Kearns had used the precautions prescribed in the rules set forth by the company, of which he was an employee, that the accident would have been avoided, and attach no blame to any individual or corporate body." Such was the verdict returned by the jury empaneled by Coroner Dr. H. N. McCullough, at the inquest held last Monday evening of Norman L. Kearns, the young telephone lineman who was electrocuted.

A large number of witnesses were examined, and the evidence was very conclusive in showing that deceased disobeyed the general instructions of his company, and failed to use the appliances provided for his safety, and was warned by his assistant of the risk he was taking in working so near the town electric light wires at the time when the power was expected to be turned on. County Crown Attorney A. H. MacDonald, of Guelph, conducted the case for the crown. Mr. H. A. Burbridge, of Hamilton, for the Bell Telephone Company. Mr. J. H. Shannon, for the C. P. R. Telegraph Company, Mr. Anson Spottier, for the town of Hamilton. The funeral took place yesterday to the Harrison Cemetery. The very large number of citizens that attended was an evidence of the esteem in which the young man was held in the community.

COMPANY EXTENDS RUNNING TIME OF THE SUNDAY CARS

Only Concession, However, Secured as Result of Agreement Conference With City.

PLAN FOR EXTENSIONS

Finance Committee of Council To Deal With Proposed Increase in Mileage.

After debating for more than two hours in a special session on Thursday evening, the city council accepted a proposal to have Sunday street cars operated from 8 a.m. to 10:30 p.m. during eight months of the year, from June 11 p.m. during the months of June, July, August and September. The fares will be seven tickets for 25 cents, with drop fares of five cents and children's fares, two for five cents, transfers as applying to all. This is, of course, subject to the ratemakers passing favorably on the Sunday car bylaw in January.

Vice-President T. H. Smallman and Manager C. B. King were present on behalf of the company, and will submit the decision of the council to the board of directors. It is generally anticipated that it will be acceptable. The agreement will be given one year's trial, and will then come back to the city council.

The company's offer was to run from 8 a.m. to 10 p.m., with the fares quoted. "Is that final?" asked Ald. Ed. Stein. "We have given serious consideration to this matter," replied Vice-President Smallman, who, with Manager King, was present at the council meeting, "and we believe that if the Sunday cars pay running expenses, that is about all they will do." Various members of the council thought that the cars should be run later than 10 o'clock, particularly in the summer, when the band concerts would be on.

Asks For Percentage. Ald. Stein believed that the street railway company had been getting something for nothing from the city for long enough, and, seconded by Ald. G. E. Rose, he moved that the company, after the first year of operation and when the average Sunday receipts had reached \$500, that the city be given 15 per cent. of the gross receipts, and that workmen's tickets be good all day Sunday. "You may put this resolution if you wish," commented Mr. Smallman, "but we have made you an offer that is final."

Mr. Smallman, in response to a question from Ald. J. P. Moore, said the company was prepared to give the Sunday cars a fair trial. If they were profitable, it was prepared to operate them until the expiration of its franchise, but if they proved a losing venture, the company wished to feel free to abandon the operation. Mr. Smallman added that the railway in Ontario was giving a fare equal to the workmen's rates in London. Here nine workmen's tickets were given for a quarter as against eight in Toronto, in spite of Toronto's much larger population.

Profit of \$210. Ald. E. H. Johnston thought that the city was entitled to something from the operation of the Sunday cars, and submitted figures to show that the company's average daily earnings were \$924. Mr. Smallman had stated that in other cities the Sunday receipts averaged about 65 per cent. of the daily receipts, which would make the average Sunday receipts in London, \$600. With the lower fares and some Sundays and fewer men, Ald. Johnston estimated, on the company's own figures, that there would be a profit of \$210 per day. He thought the aldermen would not be doing their duty if they did not make some fair agreement with the company. If such an agreement was not made he believed that the bylaw would be lost.

Mr. Smallman, in reply, said his company was not anxious to run Sunday cars, but was willing to do so if the council so wished, though he did not believe there would be any money in the proposition. The company, he said, had not averaged a 6 per cent. dividend since it had commenced operations here.

Springbank Annexation. The possibility of annexing Springbank or getting legislation to allow the running of Sunday cars to that point, were discussed, and some, including Ald. J. G. Richter, thought that the company should be given two years in which to thoroughly try out the scheme.

Manager King intimated that the company did not intend to strictly adhere to the closing hour of 10 o'clock. If the business justified running later, it was prepared to do the same.

P. R. station. The finance committee of the council will handle the matter. If the bylaw carries in January, the company will probably commence operating Sunday cars about Feb. 15. The company does not wish to commence operation of the service until hydro power is available.

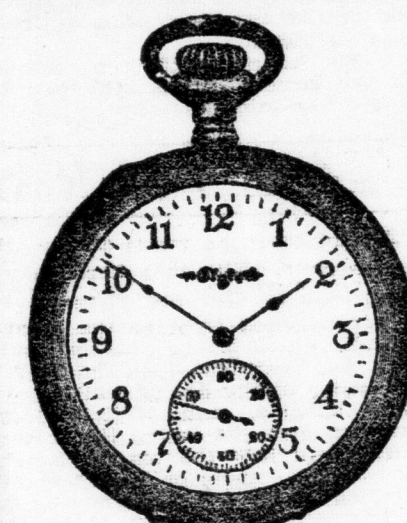
