POLICE SERGEANT READS RIOT ACT TO STRIKERS

Dozen Pickets Who Annoyed Workers and Obstructed the Traffic Ordered to Move On.

Police Sgt. Barnhill yesterday afternoon read the Riot Act to a group of striking carpenters who gathered on Richmond street, and leaning over the palisade erected around the ruins of the Dominion Savings building, proceeded to annoy with their conversation the men employed on the reconstruction of the building.

The workmen did not take kindly to the interruption and complained to the police. Sgt. Barnhill pointed out to the dozen or more strikers congregated that they were obstructing the traffic, and after he had read the riot act the strikers moved away.

Since the beginning of the strike the union has had pickets stationed all over the city, but yesterday afternoon a number of the strikers decided to go out together. The carpenters working on the Dominion Savings building did not take kindly to the urging of the strikers that they lay down their tools, and when the strikers persisted in their missionary propaganda, the workers asked the police to make them move away.

UNAFFECTED BY STRIKE ON WESTERN LINES

G. T. R. Not Anticipating Trouble, Says General Superintendent.

That the threatened strike of the western railroads in the United States will not seriously affect the Grand Trunk was the statement of H. E. Whittenberger, general superintendent of the middle division of the G. T. R., yesterday. Mr. Whittenberger passed through London en route to Port Huron on the Limited Express, No. 18, at 11:18.

"The only way in which we may feel the strike, should there be one, is that we may lose some of the western business through delay on these lines," said Mr. Whittenberger. "Everything is running smoothly on our road and there is no cause for fear trouble."

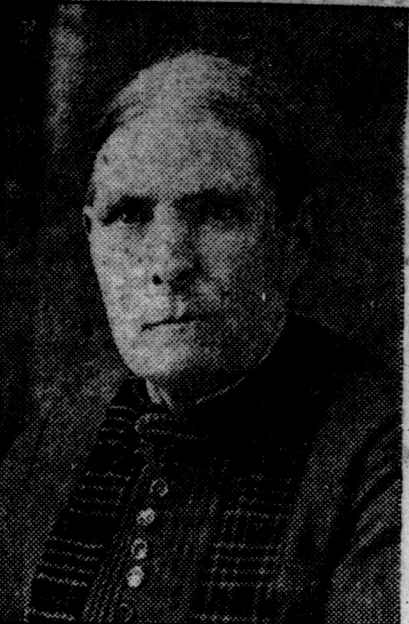

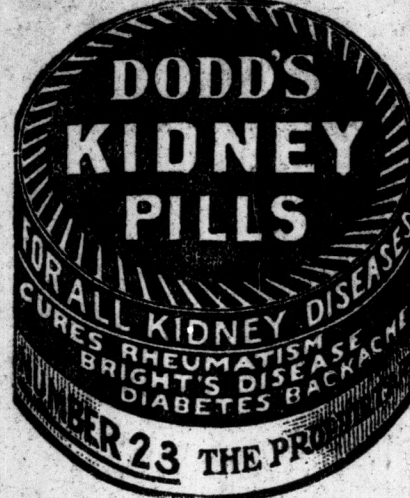
