DAM AT NIAGARA TO RAISE LEVEL OF GREAT LAKES

International Waterways Commission Recommended Expenditure of \$3,500,000.

Lake Erie Ports Would Benefit Immensely by the New Scheme.

Washington, June 27.—The Niagara River should be partially dammed by a submerged weir, thus raising the level of its upper waters and Lake Erie, it was recommended today to Congress, by the International Waterways Commission, through the president. This is the result of investigation which has existed over more than ten years. The cost of the weir and consequent works to avoid damage to property is estimated at \$3,500,000.

Several years ago the commission reported against the advisability of constructing an ordinary dam across the Niagara, because of the consequent damage to property below the dam. This dam would have completely regulated the height of the water in Lake Erie, but the latest plan contemplates only partial control.

Instinctive Value.
 The commission stated the value of the proposed works to Lake Erie ports could hardly be estimated, and that it would result in extensive improvements to harbors and docks. The commission recommended its location at Gill Creek on the American shore, and Hog Island on the Canadian, just above Welland River. The dam would raise the level of the Niagara three feet for a distance of one and a half miles. The commission suggested the construction of a levee to prevent damage to adjoining property. At low water level the Niagara River at the Buffalo waterworks would be raised 1.08 feet and at flood 1.9 feet; level of Lake Erie would be raised 51 feet at extreme low stage, 39 feet at mean, and 11 feet at extreme flood stage.

Raise the Level.
 The commission reported that the plan would raise the mean level of the level of the river at Tonawanda, Lake Huron 40 feet, the Niagara River below the weir, and Lake Ontario and the St. Lawrence River would not be appreciably affected. The level of the river at Tonawanda, N.Y., would be affected by the change, but the commission suggested the construction of a guard lock as a remedy for this.
 The commission also reported that the weir would eliminate any injurious effect upon the Lake Erie level of diversion of waters at Niagara Falls for water power purposes, and would reduce the range of oscillation on Lake Erie 4½ per cent.
 The report pointed out the diversion of water to the Chicago Drainage Canal to the Erie Canal, and for power plant purposes at Niagara Falls had considerably reduced the level of Lake Erie.

Mr. John Evans Was Ill Only One Week

After an illness of only one week Mr. John Evans, one of the city's best-known contractors, died on Friday afternoon in Victoria Hospital. He was 50 years old, and was born in London. Some time ago he moved to Exeter, but eight years ago came back to London. Besides his wife, Mrs. Louisa Evans, he leaves four sons and one daughter: Adolphus, H. Hilton, Albin, J. and Charles, all of London, and Mrs. Robert Barnes, of Ottawa, Malcolm J., of South London; Richard, of Westminster, and Mrs. R. Palmer, of West London, and Mrs. Richard Thompson, of St. Thomas, sisters. Mr. Evans was a member of the Oddfellows' Lodge. The funeral will be held on Sunday afternoon at Mount Pleasant Cemetery, and will be conducted by Rev. H. A. Graham, of the Centennial Methodist Church.

COURT CROWDED TO HEAR DETAILS OF SCOTT TRIAL

Woman Who Was Bequeathed Five Millions Made Slave of Aged Man.

Reward of \$50,000 for Production of Codicil of Will Made.

London, June 27.—The probate and divorce division of the high court of justice was fuller than ever today of well-dressed people of leisure, especially women, when the hearing in the contest of the will of Sir John Murray Scott, who left a \$5,000,000 estate to Lady Sackville, of Knole Park, Kent, wife of Baron Sackville, was resumed. The probate of the will is opposed by Malcolm Scott, a brother of the decedent, on the ground of undue influence. He has offered a reward of \$50,000 for the production of an alleged codicil executed by Sir John after he had signed the original document, and a search for it is going on in Europe and the United States.

A Big Attraction.
 The case is proving to be one of the biggest attractions of the season. People bring sandwiches and luncheons and do not leave their places during the recesses for fear that they would lose their seats. Lady Sackville, notwithstanding the wariness of the courtroom, wears throughout the proceedings a feather boa and veil, which almost completely hides her face.

A feature of today's proceedings was the testimony of Sir John's two sisters, the Misses Alicia and Mary, and his brother Walter. The sisters confirmed the previous testimony as to the influence of Lady Sackville over Sir John, who, they said, was weak. The brother Walter described how Lady Sackville had made love to him.

Like a Slave.
 Miss Alicia Scott described Sir John as "exactly like a slave" in the presence of Lady Sackville. He seemed to be powerless before her, and would carry messages, letters and parcels at her bidding.
 Sir Edward Carson, counsel for Lady Sackville, in his cross-examination elicited the fact that the witness (Miss Alicia) and other relatives had destroyed various papers after Sir John's death, but had not destroyed any documents. The witness said Sir John had assured herself and her brothers and sisters that he would leave the bulk of his estate to them, though they were aware when they destroyed the letters that he had left Lady Sackville considerable property, that he had raised no question about it at that time.

"Fairly Handsome."
 The witness admitted that Sir John had treated his sisters and brothers "fairly handsomely" during his lifetime. He gave the sisters \$25,000 each in 1899 and provided them with servants, horses and carriages. He built houses for his brothers, to whom he gave small allowances. She admitted that there had never been any disagreement between them except in regard to Lady Sackville.

Miss Alicia also admitted that Sir John's legacies amounted to \$1,150,000, apart from the \$5,000,000 which he bequeathed to Lady Sackville, but she thought that with such a large fortune he ought to have given more to the family.

In reply to a question as to whether the sisters had received an ample supply of jewels from Sir John, the witness said in a lukewarm manner: "Yes, not bad."

ENGINEER WAS ARRESTED FOR KILLING SHERBROOKE WOMAN

Police Claim He Sent Bomb in the Mail Which Exploded and Killed Mrs. Bilodeau—Prisoner Expected To Be Arrested.

Sherbrooke, Que., June 27.—On a charge of having caused the death of Mrs. Alphonsine O. Bilodeau by sending an infernal machine through the mails, L. A. Dufresne, civil engineer, of this city, was today arrested on a warrant sworn out by Kenneth P. McCaskill, chief of the provincial detective department. The arrest was made by Chief McCaskill and High Constable Moe. Dufresne is the man whose name has been on many lips during the past ten days, and as this fact was well known by him, he was evidently not surprised at being so charged. After reading the warrant he accompanied the officers to court. All he would say was: "I expected the arrest, and it is just as well that it should be so, as I wish to clear myself of these suspicions." The preliminary hearing of the accused will take place Saturday morning before Magistrate Mulvea, the accused having meanwhile been committed to the provincial jail.
