TWO THOUSAND MEN

ASSEMBLE IN HALF HOUR

TORONTO, Dec. 18.—The mobilization test carried out today by the aid of the Ontario Motor League, by which the 2,000 men of the second contingent now training at Exhibition Park were rushed from 40 different assembling points to Queen's Park, was pronounced by the military authorities to have been a complete success, occupying a little over half an hour.

About six hundred cars were engaged in transporting the soldiers.

After the mobilization in Queen's Park the men were again embarked on the cars and rushed to High Park, whence they marched to their camp.

Hospital Trust Present Its Monthly Report.

Unless unforeseen business of importance arises within the next few weeks, the last meeting of the hospital trust of 1914 was held yesterday afternoon in the City Hall. Present were Chairman Gartschke, T. G. Turnbull, Mayor Graham and Secretary T. G. Heard.

The mayor reported on the Anderson Fund, now available, and recommended that it be invested in City of London debentures.

Dr. Nelson George was appointed to the official anesthetist staff, and Dr. F. L. Guest assistant pathologist for six months.

The accounts passed amounted to \$10,317.34. The following is the superintendent's report for November, 1914:

Number of patients admitted: males, 68; females, 123; children, 81; total, 272.

Number of patients discharged: males, 78; females, 121; children, 74; total, 273.

Number of deaths, 21.

Number of births, 23.

Number of patients receiving treatment November 20, 1914, 175.

Number of patients treated in the Free Dispensary, 141.

Cash receipts for month, \$3,618.35.
