CITY COUNCIL WILL SUPPORT PENSIONS FOR CITY WORKERS

Many Matters Will Be Voted On at Next Meeting of Aldermen.

WILL GRADE CLERKS

Meeting last night to look into the mayor's proposals and discuss other postponed business, the city council expressed some support for forms of civic insurance and civic pensions. These and other matters relating to administrative offices were passed on to be investigated by No. 1 committee and will be voted on at the next meeting of the council.

Mayor Wenige was absent, and Ald. Douglass, chairman of No. 1 committee, presided. Others in attendance were Aldermen Anderson, Drake, Walsh, Smith, McKay and Hayden, the latter being the sole representative of No. 2 committee. City officials were well represented. A scant quorum was secured just inside the time limit, and a brief, one-hour session cleaned the boards of a fair-sized agenda.

Outlines Scheme. Ald. Douglass outlined the scheme of superannuation for the dominion civil service, and advocated some such system for the city employees. A fifth of each employee's salary would be put into a fund for a certain number of years, so that he could retire at the end of his career and have a moderate income. The scheme would not be compulsory, but would be made sufficiently attractive for all employees to desire it. Heads of departments were asked to get together to grade their clerks as first, second and third class, according to training and ability. In this way salaries in the various departments could be fixed with equity to all of the same abilities. The department heads declared that this information could be secured in time for the next session of No. 1 committee.

"I don't think you have any better in the dominion of Canada than you have in London," declared Ald. Drake, in speaking of London's officials. Chairman Douglass was of the opinion that the ratepayers should have another opportunity to vote on the commission form of government. As no special requests have been made this year, he suggested the argument for this form of government the matter was referred back to committee to report on.

Meeting on Friday. City Treasurer Bell reported that the city was paying out \$15,000 annually for insurance. This included the Western Fair buildings, where the premiums were exceptionally high. It was suggested that all the city's property, including that governed by other bodies than the council, be linked up in a civic insurance scheme. The scheme will be investigated by No. 1 committee.

Ald. Edwin Smith reported that a meeting would be held with chamber of commerce representatives on Friday afternoon at 4 o'clock to discuss changes in aldermanic elections. Ald. Walsh was appointed to act in place of Ald. Douglass as the latter will be out of the city on that day.

DOWLER ELECTED C. OF C. PRESIDENT

Manager of Clothing Store Will Succeed Major Gordon Ingram.

R. H. Dowler, president and manager of R. H. & J. Dowler, Limited, was elected president of the London chapter of commerce yesterday afternoon by the C. of C. directors, in succession to the retiring president, Major Gordon Ingram. J. J. Foote and T. W. McFarland were elected vice-presidents.

In assuming office amid the prayers of his fellow directors, Mr. Dowler made this year the new year, and stressed particularly the work to be done in uniting Western Ontario along commercial lines.

A letter was read from Dr. Horace L. Brittain, expressing appreciation of the invitation from London to hold the next Canadian tax conference here. Dr. Brittain promised to submit the invitation to the next board meeting of the citizens' research institute, and it is likely that the conference will take place in London.

A letter was read by Secretary Gordon Philip from W. R. Campbell, vice-president of the Ford Motor Company, stating that P. N. Main- gage would be in charge of the London plant of the company which would deal with sales, service and light assembling for the district from Windsor to Brantford.

Frank Adams and Harry Peel reported that with the Ontario government the request of the Western Ontario fish and game protective association that no fish nets be allowed on the River Thames.

Suggested changes in bylaws of the chamber were discussed, and if approved at a further meeting will be submitted to a general meeting. One change is that the period between the time that a director can take office for a second term be changed from one to two years, and that the retiring president of the chamber become automatically a member of the new board of directors.

The rest of the meeting was devoted to a discussion of the street railway situation, the directors being anxious for a proper solution of the city's transportation problems.

FIRST HEAVY FROST OF SEASON IS FELT

Thermometer Drops to 26 Degrees—End of Grapes and Vegetables.

The first heavy frost of the season visited London and district late last night and put an end to the growing efforts of late vegetables and grapes. Towards 9 o'clock the heavy clouds cleared away and the stars came out to twinkle with frosty eye on the city. The thermometer dropped to 26 degrees.

Up to date this fall, best efforts of John Frost have been more or less feeble and have been reserved for the benefit of early risers only. Not so this morning, however. Citizens who make a practice of reaching their offices at 9 o'clock were treated to slippery sidewalks despite the warm attentions of the sun.

Last night's frost will mean that stubborn chestnut buds all over the county will open wide to disgorge the nuts without which a Halloween party can hardly be held. It also means that farmers will get busy on the picking of fall and winter apples.

SAYS O. T. A. FITS MODERATION ONLY

Speaker For Moderation League Thinks Law Too Perfect For This Age.

Almost tearful complaint that public men in this city and other cities were not coming out into the open as they were in favor of government control while at the same time, it was said, they had subscribed privately to the funds of the league, featured the Moderation league meeting last night in the Masonic hall.

A. R. Douglas was the first speaker called upon by the chairman, Lt.-Col. W. T. Lawless, D.S.O., following music by the G. W. V. A. band.

At the outset of his remarks Mr. Douglas characterized as the greatest temperance achievement of all time the 60 per cent reduction in the consumption of alcohol brought about by the English government by the enactment of "a stiff measure of government control" in England during the four years following the outbreak of the war.

Claims that temperance leaders here had stamped the Ontario government, Mr. Douglas stated that the provincial government had attempted oversight to bring in temperance legislation, which even the most ardent temperance man could not have expected until the arrival of the millennium.

Hits Medicine Plea. The speaker criticized the government for the sale of liquor under the O. T. A. for medicinal purposes. He declared that liquor was not a medicine but a beverage and would always remain so. "Physicians write prescriptions for men who don't need them. If that is not so why are there such queues of men at the dispensaries before holidays and festive seasons?"

"Sweep away the rubbish of the O. T. A. and the government will give you a rational and sensible act if you ask for it."

Fred C. Betts, representative of the Moderation league in this district, charged that the principles of the O. T. A. were un-Christian and un-British, and that its clauses had been made un-Christian and un-British in order that it might be more easily enforced.

That act was administered for four years by Mr. Rex (Mr. Macpherson) "No, don't laugh; he's a tragedy; we should weep when we think of him."

"Hon. Mr. Nickle, the present attorney-general, is a man with brains and decency. He has tried his level best to enforce the act, but by fair means. It is no better enforced, however, than before. The O. T. A. is a farce; it is a joke."

Mr. Betts claimed that the O.T.A. was destroying public honesty and public freedom of thought and action, and that it was a farce. He said that the big men who used to lead us in the past, what is the reason that they give us being this silent? It is: "I will hurt you and your family. Our opponents have us all befogged and beclouded; they have us all bound round with cobwebs and shackles. There are no more to be continued. They are not asked to go to war; they are merely asked to come out into the open and declare themselves instead of giving us the slogan: 'Don't use our names.'"

Defends Manitoba. Fred W. Russell, president of the Moderation League of Manitoba, defended the league of Manitoba, which he declared, had been "most atrociously traduced by the prohibitionist press and speakers."

"The prohibitionists seem to be basing their main campaign upon vilification of those provinces which, in their wisdom, have adopted government control. There is a strong spirit of resentment in the west against that campaign. I believe that there are enough lines of cleavage between the provinces without injecting this resentment into it. If the people of Ontario give it the proper rebuke on voting day, however, it won't hurt them so much (Laughter and applause)."

"Until prohibition was practiced in North America," pursued Mr. Russell, "there was no such thing as a country which had practiced it, and that was Turkey. (Laughter.)" "And prohibition helped to evolve the 'unspeakable Turk'." "In fact, we feel that prohibition was developing a species of 'unspeakable Canadian' until our government liquor control act was passed."

"The evil of the hip pocket flask among the young people has vanished in Manitoba, and the parents are grateful to the moderation league for what they have done in that regard."

"Bootlegging has practically all passed away; certainly the bootlegger de luxe. The rotten bootlegger stuff that wrecks men, body, mind and soul, is no longer on the market."

Mr. Russell stated that the Manitoba government had realized \$1,200,000 out of the sale of liquor in less than one year. For Ontario the proportionate amount would be between \$8,000,000 and \$9,000,000. Referring to the fact that such money had been set down as "tainted money," the speaker said that it could even be seen in such an argument was that "it isn't my money."

"Manitoba has government control," concluded Mr. Russell, "the western provinces have it and will never go back to prohibition. Quebec has government control, is Ontario going to stay out of confederation?"

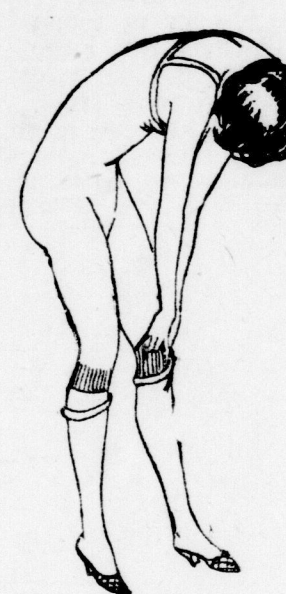
LOMBARDO'S CALLED BEST ORCHESTRA IN CLEVELAND
