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FIRE IN SWAMP
BLAZES MERRILY

Little Damage Done by Fire

On Campbell Farm, Komoka.

A fire starting in the Komoka swamp

yesterday afternoon was still blazing

merrily this morning. A fifteen-acre

area of underbrush has been destroyed,

residents state, and unless rain arrives

very soon, grave fears are entertained

for some valuable cedar timber a quarter

of a mile from the fire area.

"It is not burning very fast," declared

Dr. J. Matheson, Komoka store-keeper,

this morning. However, there is a lot of

valuable timber close by, and if we don't

get rain soon it is likely to go."

The underbrush licked up by the

flames during the night is owned by

Alfred J. Campbell, who left the property

yesterday morning to take over some

better farm land in the vicinity. The

house and barn in connection with the

place still stands, although the flames

were quite close to them at times.

High Constable Wharton, who visited

the locality last night, states that no

particular effort is being made to fight

the fire, the residents apparently feeling

that it will burn itself out. The damage

so far has been very small, in the opinion

of the villagers, who are used to seeing

fires in the swamp.
