BOARD SEE SYSTEM OF HIGH PRESSURE

McClary's Best Protected Plant in London Says Fire Chief Clark

Yesterday afternoon the board of fire underwriters made an official test of the new high pressure system recently put in by the McClary Manufacturing Company, of this city. The test was eminently satisfactory to the underwriters and as a result, the Mc-Clary firm will effect a reduction of over 50 per cent. in their insurance rates.

Few manufacturers realize what this means to a large firm who have to pay thousands of dollars every year for insurance premiums. In the Mc-Clary case, for instance, it means that in a very few years the high pressure system, which cost approximately \$35,000 to instal, will have paid for itself and besides the firm will have an efficient fire protection system of their own.

McClarys are the first firm in the city to put in one of these systems, and already the firm of C. R. Somerville are following their example.

The system consists of a pump capable of discharging 1,000 gallons of water per minute, and a system of pipes which are arranged so as to connect with all the different buildings of the McClary plant. The pump is operated by steam, which is supplied by the boiler and a pressure of 50 pounds per square inch is maintained night and day. Yesterday the steam pressure was up to 120 pounds and the ease with which the large streams were forced over all parts of the plant satisfied the underwriters perfectly. The pump is supplied from an immense concrete reservoir which the McClary people have constructed in the rear of their premises.
