Premier Sir John Abbott Corrects a Sta

MONTREAL, Sept. 2.—(Special.) — In speaking of the proclamation of President Harrison, Sir John Abbott today said: "Secretary Foster takes exception to what he claims to be a veiled threat in the Canadian Government's communication that, should his Government impose tolls on Canadian vessels using the Sault Sts. Marie canal the Canadian Government would not consider itself bound to observe the promise made at the Council meeting. It was not intended as a threat, veiled or otherwise, but simply to convey an intimation that should the U. S. Government take any action of this kind, this would enter into our consideration when the matter was again brought forward. The Government merely wished not to pledge itself to any definite policy until it was known what steps the U. No tug boat shall be employed to tow any barge or any boat, bateau, scow or undecked vessel having passengers on board, unless such vessel has been inspected by an inspector of hulls and equipmer t, and by him certified, as provided in schedule C of this Act, to be fit and properly equipped to carry passengers on the waters on which she is as towed, and no such vessel shall when so towed have on board a greater number of passengers than she is certified as being fit to carry salely:

No person shall act in a double capacity of engineer and master on any steamboat, or as engineer and fireman on any steamboat, having an engine of over seven nominal h.p. and required by law to carry a certified engineer, except in cases where the boiler is fired from the engine room. Every engineer holding a certificate of competency, whether granted under this act or under the acts of the United Kingdom relating to Merchants' Shipping, who is employed on any steamboat, shall keep his certificate of competency posted up, famed and protected by glass, in some conspicuous place in the engine room of such steamer, and every engineer neglecting to daso shall incur a penalty of \$30.
