

A letter received by the collector of customs at Juneau, Alaska, orders the condemnation of the British Columbia schooner Josephine, seized at Ketchikan some time ago for landing beef from the Queen Charlotte islands without en-tering. The secretary of the treasury wrote as follows regarding the seizure: "This department is in receipt of your letter relative to the seizure of the Brit-ish schooner Josephine, of 10 tons bur-den, and returned as being of the value of \$250, for an alleged violation of sec-tion 3109, revised statutes, as amended by section 10 of the act of February 14, 1903, and by section 4 of the act of Feb-ruary 17, 1898. The vessel came to Two sealing schooners were reported from the west coast, the Ida Etta and Carrie C. W., each with over 400 skins. On the arrival of the steamer Queen on Saturday—it is expected that the ma-jority of the "Siwash" schooners of the sealing fleet will be reported. 
