Somewhere in France

13-10-15

My Dear Mother:

I received your most welcome letter yesterday and was awfully glad to know that all were well. I am feeling fine except for a slight cold, but we all have that so it is nothing to worry about. I am sorry that you had to wait so long for a letter, but it was not my fault for I write to you at least every three weeks. I have sent several cards, so there must be some mail going astray. You want to be very careful how you address my letter, as a slight mistake will delay it a month or more. I have sent Bert the proper address so you can get it from her. Well, now for a little war news. Of course, you know we are not allowed to say much about what is going on, but I will do my best. The French and British are having great success. On their advance they say the slaughter of the Germans is something awful. The First Contingent are not doing much real fighting just now. We are just holding our trenches, and it gets very tiresome. We would rather do some of the fighting. We do a lot of work digging trenches and building parapets and dugouts. In our homes we have to live like rats in a hole in the ground in this war. We had a great sight of one today. It was something wonderful the antics he cut in the air. He was being shelled by the German Anti-Air (craft) guns. He would drop two or three hundred feet, you would think that they had hit him, but he would loop the loop, regain his level, spiral around like a cork screw, dodge in and out to fool those who thought they would get him. He is about the best there is out here, we call him the mad major. Anything that he cannot do with a plane is not worth doing. We see such sights as that quite often. You were wanting to know what I thought about Howard joining. I think it is the best thing that he could do. Bert says Harry wants to join. He is a little young, but there is as young as he out here. I will not recommend to let him come, but it certainly would not do him any harm to have the training. It would make a man of him, but I know how you feel about it. I know that you worry a lot about me and now I expect Howard is added to that worry. But Mother Dear, remember this, that man is born but once to die and what better death could you wish them than dying for their country's honor. There are mothers in England who have more

ARMAND LAVERGNE REFUSES

REQUEST TO RECRUIT MEN

Quebec, Nov. 3.—Armand Lavergne, M.L.A. for Montmagny, in the course of a long letter to the Minister of Militia, Maj.-Gen. Sir Sam Hughes declines the Minister's offer of a commission to recruit a battalion at Montmagny for foreign service.

Mr. Lavergne gives as his reason for refusal the following:

"As you know, I am, and was always, opposed to the participation of Canada in the wars of the Empire, to discuss now, is my absolute conviction, and, consequently, I cannot assume the responsibility of asking Canadians to take part in a war, which is not solely for the defence of Canada."

"Let me repeat here that I consider it little wise and most criminal to put Canada in danger for a war in which we have never had and we will never have, any control whatsoever. I am opposed to, and I will oppose with all my force and with what little talent Providence has given me, the contribution by our country of a man, of a ship or a dollar, until England thinks it a duty to allow us to participate not only in the dangers, but also in the control and responsibilities of the affairs of the Empire. It is not for us to defend England; it is for England to defend us. Our sole obligation is the defence for her of our country, Canada."
