The arbitrators on the building laborers strike met again Saturday in the board of trade rooms. Evidence was heard and concluded on that part of the question relative to the ingrease of wages asked for concluded on that part of the question relative to the increase of wages asked for. The next point to be taken up will be the eligibility of those men who worked during the present strike membership in the Laborses' union. There is a disposition on the part of the strikers to deny these men the privileges of membership. The builders' employers think that the men who helped them during the present crisis should, upon agreeing to adhere to rules of the union, be granted the right of membership, but the laborers on the other hand hold out strongly to the contrary and refuse to work the laborers on the other hand held out strengly to the contrary and refuse to work with them. If this aspect of the case is not amicably decided, the strike is but little nearer settlement than when it began. The arbitrators meet at the call of the chair. It is likely they will present their finding on the points already heard and discussed this week.
