\$210 DAMAGES AND COSTS. The Doctor Couldn't Prove That Kells

Chief Justice Galt occupied the bench at the York Assize Court yesterday. The case of Edward Kells v. Thou mell was the first on the list, and the day was taken up in adducing the Keils agreed to work a farm of Dr. Mc

Connell's, in Peel County, on shares, re presenting himself to be a first-class farme and possessed of sufficient means and agricultural implements to run the farm.

The agreement was made in April, 1891, and Kells came into Toronto in June to get possession of the agreement, but Mr. Robert Gilray, counsel for the defendant, refused to deliver it to him, inasmuch as the Doctor had arrived at the conclusion that Kells, in representing himself to be a first-class manager and worker, had made a false and fraudulent statement, and that in reality he had little experience as a farmer and no money or implements.

Kells was told by the solicitor that the deal was off and was warned against going back on the farm, as he would be guilty of trespass in so doing. Shortly afterward his furniture was moved from the farm house into a shed belonging to the Grand Trunk Railway by agents of the defendant.

Kells was also told by Dr. McConnell's solicitor at the time of their conference that sed of sufficient means and agri

solicitor at the time of their conference that if he wanted redress the County Court was

open to him.

Suit was accordingly brought, damages for crops sowed and not reaped, etc., being assessed at \$700 and costs.

The jury, after being out for about half an hour, brought in a verdict in favor of the plaintiff, assessing the damages at \$210 and the costs of the suit.

Beaty; Hamilton & Snow acted for the plaintiff and James Haverson for the defence.

They Want the Bequest. Richard Senior of Ayr died on July 10, 1892, leaving a will in which he directed certain legacies to be paid, and the residue of the estate to be divided equally between the Presbyterian Mission Society, the Methodist Mission Society and the Upper Canada Bible Society. The heirs at law Superiority. attacked the will, asking for construction and to have the bequests of the residue de clared void. Chief Justice Galt delivered clared void. Chief Justice Gait delivered judgment in the case, holding the bequest to the Methodist Mission Society void, no such society being in existence. The bequests to the other societies were declared void, so far as they consisted of real estate or the proceeds thereof. From this judgment the Methodists appealed and the Court of Appeal heard argument yesterday.


