About four o'clock in the afternoon, in response to the skillful calling of the guide, the animal—a bull—appeared suddenly at a distance of no further than twenty-four paces from the hunters. All three fired and all the bullets took effect. After being struck the animal ran fully one hundred paces before falling dead. On examination it was found that one of the three bullets had passed directly through the heart. The carcass was sold to R. M. Williams. The antlers had a spread of almost four feet.

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## President Palma of Cuba, Will Resign

He Declined To Give An Interview But It Is Known He Contemplates This Step.

(Special Despatch to the Monitor.)  
Havana, September 26.—President Palma declined a request last evening of a correspondent of The Associated Press for an interview. It is known, however, that he contemplates a special session of congress to which he will send the resignations of himself and Mendez Capote.

All the moderate palace officials concede that intervention is at hand. They appear perfectly satisfied with that course against delivering the government of the Island to their adversary. Mendez Capote has been directed to advise Messrs Taft and Bacon that the moderates refuse the proffered terms.

## Steamer Minto's Hard Experience

Tempestuous Seas Swept Her Deck Almost Continuously While on Voyage to North Sydney.

Sydney Sept. 26.—The Government Steamer Minto, Capt. Finlayson, which arrived at North Sydney from Belle Isle had one of the most trying trips in her experience. Tempestuous seas were encountered almost from the time of

departure till her arrival. One sea struck the stern carrying away 50 tons of coal which she had on deck, and on another occasion she was struck by a high Comber which swept the decks and started some of the bolts in the steering gear aft.

## Amherst Had \$40,000 Fire Yesterday

C. J. Silliker and Company's Extensive Wood Working Plant Totally Destroyed

Amherst, September 26.—C. J. Silliker and Company's extensive buildings on Albion Street including Wood working factory, ware rooms for finished work and general offices were totally destroyed by fire which broke out at 12:40 yesterday. Only one man was in the

works. A spark ignited some shavings it is believed and in a few minutes the factory was all aflame. The Company's loss is about \$40,000 with insurance for about one half. The 150 men employed inside and outside need not remain unemployed as there is abundance of work in town.

Havana, September 26.—It is declared on very high authority that American intervention in Cuba is certain. Furthermore it is expected that a proclamation of intervention will be issued from Oyster Bay.
