**PEACE TREATY SIGNED**

News reached here just before noon on Saturday of the signing of the Peace Treaty. As at the signing of the Armistice, the St. James Church bell was the first to ring out the good news in Bridgetown. Flags were soon in evidence, some of the decorations on the lawns at the private residences being very tastefully arranged.

**Pte. Tibbetts Missing**

**Recent Deaths**

Alfred J. Bell, well known insurance man, died suddenly at Halifax Monday morning of heart trouble, age 62 years. He leaves his wife, who was Dr. James Hertz, daughter of Rev. Mr. Hertz, and one son. The death occurred at his home in Amherst last week of A. D. Ross, for many years editor of the Amherst Daily News, and an uncle of C. C. King of Annapolis Royal.

**G. W. V. A.**

At the regular meeting of the Bear River Branch of the G. W. V. A., held on Tuesday, Comrade Stewart I. Robinson was elected as a delegate to the Provincial Command Convention to be held at New Glasgow on July 15th. Other important business was transacted and resolutions passed. The meeting was well attended, a large number of new members being present.

**Is Your Birth Registered?**

Our readers will be interested to learn that all persons born in this Province prior to 1908 may apply for registration of their births to the Deputy Registration General, Halifax. For many years prior to 1908 there was no registration of births in this Province and consequently the births of the majority of Nova Scotians are officially unrecorded. The advantage of being able to produce an official birth certificate at any time is obvious.

**Death of Capt. Howard Anderson**  
**One of Digby's Most Prominent Residents Has Passed Away**

The sudden death of Capt. Howard Anderson has cast a gloom over Digby and a large number of the residents of many parts of Nova Scotia, the Upper Provinces, Newfoundland and the United States. He was taken ill Thursday with intense pain, local physicians summoned and on Saturday a specialist arrived from Halifax with trained nurse. He was operated on Saturday afternoon and passed away about 6.30 p.m. without recovering from the operation.

Capt. Anderson was born in Annapolis Co. 63 years ago, and when a young man became a master mariner. Years ago he retired from the sea and was a very successful wholesale fish dealer. In 1909 he sold out his business to the Maritime Fish Corporation of Montreal, and became the mechanical superintendent of their Digby branch, and was certainly highly valued by the Corporation, being continually consulted by the head office, and his advice taken in all the principal affairs concerning any of the branches. He had a large circle of friends and was universally esteemed by everybody. He was everyone's friend and nobody's enemy. He was a member of King Solomon Lodge A. F. & A. M., a charter member of the Western Nova Scotia Yacht Club, and assisted everything that was for the good of the community in which he resided or for the entire country. He leaves a widow, who was formerly Miss Florence Adams of Deep Brook; one son, Conn. Frank Anderson, of Digby; two daughters, Mrs. Annie, wife of Rev. Mr. Bower of North Carolina, and Lena, wife of Mr. Harms, of Edmonton, all of whom expect to be present at the funeral, which takes place from his late residence, King street, Friday afternoon.

**Annapolis County Baptist and Denominational Work**

The following items taken from the report of the committee on Denominational work presented at the recent meeting of the Western Baptist Association should be of interest to the members of our churches who were not able to be present. It should be noted that the Association is composed of the churches in Digby, Annapolis and Lunenburg counties:

The Association was allotted for the year 1918 \$6,810 and raised \$5649.67, having a deficit of \$1160.33.

The Association has been allotted for 1919, \$7,000.

In 1918 the number of churches raising their allotments were: Digby 3, Annapolis 6, Lunenburg 7.

Sixteen churches raised their allotments and 36 failed. Twenty seven churches increased their contributions and 19 decreased their contributions. Four churches made no contribution.

We are more concerned with the Annapolis District. Here we have a populous and prosperous community, comprising the following churches, which are expected by the Convention to contribute approximately the same amounts as last year, namely:
