very sad way this winter, drinking and illusing his wife and family: that he had cause to feel gratitude to God for having given him this warning, instead of cutting him off in his sin. George seemed to feel his position, and I trust that this warning will be productive of good; I read and prayed. I then proceeded to the school-house, where I found a goodly number of Indians, with their wives and children, numbering in all about forty, with three white men. I said the full Evening Service, and having spoker to them individually, and also delivered a message from the Superintendent of Indian Affairs, I returned with Mr. Burkitt to his house to tea, having spent a very busy and, I trust, a profitable day.

Wednesday, February 6th.—I intended this morning to start for Spanish River, on the north shore of the Lake Huron, 42 miles from Little Current, to preach to the Indians and white lumbermen on the river, but hearing from some of the men who have just arrived from LaCloche, the Hudson Bay Co.'s Establishment, that it is not safe to attempt it just now, on account of the state of the ice on the river, I thought it would be more prudent to defer my visit to that place till my next Missionary tour.
