There is also a separate part for a hot air furnace, by which means it is possible to heat the building on the top, on a system of Mr. Mills, an ingenious and recent invention of the inventor. The ground floor is appropriated for the purposes of a Market, with stairs to the upper floor on each side of the principal entrance. There is a passage two feet wide running through the entire length of the building, and also a passage two feet wide at each end. The upper floor is intended for a town Hall, which will be 94 feet long, 40 feet wide, and 20 feet high, with a handsome cornice, eared ceiling, and an enriched centre-piece. There is also a office for the clerk and a gallery for spectators. The south-east and north-east fronts are to be constructed of stone, and are of the same description as that seen in the great Hall of the Banks of Montreal and British North America in this city.

The contract has been taken for the sum of £2,500, and the building is to be completely finished on the 1st of November, 1849. The total ensemble of the building is elegant, and expressive of the taste and skill of the Architect James Tully, Esq., a resident of this city, who is favourably known by several architectural works of much merit.
