SEVEN PLAIN REASONS.

We know of several works calculated to strengthen men in their Churchmanship to induce Dissenters, where not too narrow or too prejudiced, to become Church people. Amongst these might be mentioned at least two such works published in America, which, we fancy, must be having great influence for good in addition, many to the Church of America, and their system of Sunday-school teaching cannot fail to do great things for the coming generation. We must, however, place the work by Mr. Oldham amongst the very best of the many works on this subject that have been put before us. It is a convincing book, and done in a straightforward, manly, Christian spirit. We greatly desire that thoughtful, religious Dissenters would study it, and would try, as they read it, to answer it. We wish that the truth only may prevail, and are sure that it will not prevail through the Church being other than Christ interested in, one in spirit and heart, and actual exhibit to before the world. The few quotations contained in it are of a powerful character, and are of themselves deserving of much thought. We can hardly understand a conscientious man or woman amongst dissenting communities who will honestly consider this work and not seek, after prayer and thought, the unity of the Anglican communion.
