I have advised the Secretary-General of the United Nations that Canada does not wish to proceed with the Fifth United Nations Congress on the Prevention of Crime and the Treatment of Offenders this year. I have sought the Secretary-General's cooperation in obtaining a postponement of the Congress and he has undertaken to study the situation in order to clarify his position. In the Government's view, this Congress cannot be held successfully anywhere this year.

Honourable Members will recall that at the
Fourth Congress held in Kyoto, in 1970, the Government of
Canada, in consultation with the Province of Ontario,
proposed that the venue of the next congress be Toronto,
in September of 1975. This proposal was accepted by
delegations and subsequently confirmed by the General
Assembly. Since that time, however, there has been a
steady deterioration of the atmosphere in which international conferences are held. I need hardly mention the
discord which marred the Sixth Special Session and the
last regular Session of the General Assembly, the recent
conferences of the United Nations Industrial Development
Organization (UNIDO) and of the International Labour
Organization (ILO) as well as the International Women's
Year Conference in Mexico, a few weeks ago.
