42 acres of land. It was considered it would be a great hardship to deprive Mr. Wood of the land and it was decided last October to permit him to purchase it at the rate of \$3 per acre, being the value placed thereon by a homestead inspector—such sale to exhaust Mr. Wood's right to a purchased homestead.
