### D. F. A. PRESIDENT **OUTLINES CRISIS**

Montreal Star: President Craig Campbell of the D.F.A. makes the following statement of the present soccer trouble: As one P.Q.F.A. member put it, every three years brings a soccer revolution, and with threats in the air another is imminent, unless the first division clubs get their way and can force the D.F.A. to change a clause passed without a murmur last August in Toronto dealing with manufacturing clubs, which law segregates such clubs to a league of their own kind. Now all this is well known, but, like "John Brown's body, trouble will go marching on. The first division are united, others merely watching to see which way the "cat jumps." That such a clause was passed is really no surprise at all. It has been the talk locally for years by those that follow the game as closely as it should be followed before a real opinion can be expressed. The minutes of the first division will show that, for this year anyway, they have never taken kindly to "Instructions." According to them, they were the law and authority, but the law, whether it was three days for a Connaught Cup registration or fourteen days, or as a matter of fact anything else that did not suit them. No one would suggest for a minute that they are not honest in the opinions they hold, simply an insatiable desire to "buck authority."

"An extraordinary general meeting may be convened by the president at the request of a majority of the council, or a majority of the members, for the purpose of considering such matters as may properly be submitted to such meeting. Thirty days' notice must be given for such extraordinary meeting, and each member shall receive fifteen days' notice of the meeting, and the subjects to be dealt with. An extraordinary general meeting shall not be held within three months of the annual general meeting shall be accompanied by a deposit of three hundred dollars (\$300), which may be forfeited or returned, as the meeting determine."
