Terms, however, the Enemy is yet too haughty to accept. What mighty Cause, then, have we to triumph? And, more particularly, if we reflect, and furely we ought to reflect, on the State of our Public Debt, which has been fo much inflamed by his Measures, that the Nation already staggers under its fromense Load: A Consideration which is the more affecting, as the Confequences will be much more feverely felt on the Decline of our Trade; which must necessarily be expected whenever the Sword is sheathed, and a happy Period put to the Rage of War; and more especially as it seems to be a Point given up, (which, for my Country's Sake, I am forry to hear) that the French should be allowed the Fishing-Trade in the Gulf of St. Laurence, and the Banks
