In the first heat he won in 2:27 1/2, but she just romped home, with Bonnie Claude, Dr. Parker's pacer, second, and Easter Sunday, R. Scott's grey pacer, in third position. PHILADELPHIA CRICKET Halifax Cup Averages-Half a Dozen Centuries Recorded.

PHILADELPHIA, Nov. 9.-In batting, the averages in the Halifax Cup competition for the season of 1910 are up to the standard of the previous few years. Willie Graham of the Belmont Cricket Club led at the top of the list in both batting and bowling averages, and, therefore, became the holder of the Childe Cup in the season. This double feat has only been twice duplicated since the cups were donated by the late George W. Childe, and curiously enough it was a Belmont man who performed the feat on each occasion, J. B. King having won them in 1902 and 1904.

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LANDSLIDES IN ROCKIES Traffic Both Ways Held Up Near Golden, B. C.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 9.-[Special.] A rock and land slide on the main line of the C.P.R. two miles east of Golden in the Rockies occurred yesterday afternoon, and as a result several hundred passengers, both eastbound and westbound, are effectually tied up for a period ranging from 12 to 24 hours.
