### Awakening of England In Regard to Athletics

LONDON, Sept. 5 .- The failure of Great Britain to secure better results at the Olymp'c games at Stockholm is explained today in the report of the British Olympic Committee, which says: the "It was not mere specialization which enabled Sweden and the United States to do better than the British Empire. The only winner of three gold medals came from Finland. The Pen-tathlon and Decathlon were won by an

American who showed quite extraord-inary all-round ability. Sweden won all the points in the modern Pentathlon and obtained more points than any other nation in the whole of the games by sedulously cultivating every form of physical ability possessed by her inhabitants, and her strength and capacity as a nation have been enormously increased in the process."

The lack of serious interest in the games on the part of the British public, is declared by the committee to have greatly affected the enthusiasm of the British competitors. Owing to want of funds these also were deprived of opportunities for training under trainers acquainted with the best scientific methods.

It rests with the British public, says the report, whether this state of things shall be remedied in the future.
