A DETAIL IN THE NEW POLICY.

According to returns made by the Bureau of Statistics of the Treasury Department of Washington the imports into the United States from Canada for 1898 were \$30,450,208, while the exports to Canada were \$30,454,806. The great disparity between Canada's exports to and imports from the United States was the principal argument used by the Canadian Commissioners at Washington in their request to the United States to reduce the duties on various Canadian products entering the United States. The United States Commissioners refused to entertain the Canadian proposals. It remains now for Canada to see what she can do on her own account to remove this disparity. Canada purchases sixty million dollars more from the United States annually than the latter purchases from us. As long as this disparity exists we may expect no treaty or import from our neighbors. If the Canadian Government were to invest in our imports from the United States systematically they would soon ascertain that the bigger part of them might just as well be made in this country as imported. We take it that the Government has received a mandate from the people to institute a vigorous policy against the Americans, not with a view of injuring them, but for the purpose of establishing our own independence and developing our own resources. The World has already suggested several measures which should be subjected to a high protective duty in order to prevent their importation from the States. One that we wish to refer to to-day is steel rails. Last year we imported \$2,000,000 worth of steel rails from the United States. If Sir Wilfrid Laurier understands the temper of the people of this country he will have no hesitation in increasing the duty on steel rails to such a degree as will force British or American iron men to establish rolling mills in Canada for the production of steel rails. Canada is just entering an era of development during which more capital is required than during any period in our past history. It is a matter of course that the country to place a prohibitive duty on rails, while this act will prove a much stronger argument than any that was urged by our Commissioners at Washington. Never was there a better opportunity than the present for our establishing this industry. Great Britain is running short of iron ore. British iron men are now in this country looking for supplies of ore. Iron furnaces are about to be erected at Midland, Belleville and in Nova Scotia, in all of which United States capitalists are interested. If we impose a high duty on steel rails American capitalists will be tumbling over one another to get into Canada first and occupy the ground.

SERVICE MUST BE IMPAIRED

When Doing of the Character Given Can Take Place at the High Level Station.

HEAL CURSED HIS EMPLOYEES

And One of Them Called Him a Liar

But There's Nothing in an Investigation Before Aldermen.

At yesterday morning's session of the special committee looking into the trouble at the high level pumping station the deputation of the Engineers was taken up. His story differed in detail from that of Heald regarding delay in getting up steam at the time of the Hees fire. The trouble between himself and Heald was caused by telephone messages intended for the pumping station being intercepted at Heald's house.

Mills' Written Statement.

Mills put in a written statement, as follows:

On April 1, 1898, an alarm of fire from box 134 came in at 4:25 p.m. The fireman was just in the act of cleaning his fire, and had checked the speed of the blower engine for that purpose, but as soon as he heard the alarm was for us he turned on the blower a little stronger and hurried to the station. The steam engine was attending to the main engine and had things running nicely when Mr. Heald came to the station. The steam had dropped to below 100 lbs. Mr. Heald said: "You ought to be here, but when cleaning fires, but she will soon come up." I guess we might give a little more steam, but I was not sure. I thought the fire was out, and I waited a minute longer in putting on the steam, as the fireman was not quite through with his work. The steam was not quite up to 110 lbs. in a very short time, and in several minutes after the alarm came in the water pressure was 90 lbs., but we could not get much over 100 lbs. Mr. Heald left the station about 4:40 and came back again over 4:50, stating that he had been over at the fire, but did not want to go very close, so he sent me over, telling me to notify the Healds that they were getting from the hose, and to ask someone how things were. He spoke about the steam not being up, but I was large enough, hence the difficulty in getting over 100 lbs. pressure. While we were waiting, Mr. Heald came back and read the gauges, and I think it was 4:50 when he returned. He explained that he had got her up long ago, and that the Healds were not to hold her. When I returned I told Mr. Heald that one of the men working on the burning factory had been told that the pressure was very poor. I could see for myself that it was not good. He went away then, and about 11:00, when I was ready to go home (Lewis had relieved me), I called on the Healds and asked me to check the pressure to 55 lbs.

Heald Examined Mills' Statement.
