THE KINGDOM OF NAVARRE

Carlisle Agitators Want to Reconstruct It.

Queen of Greece Bestows the Medal for Valor Upon 100 Women.

How Dreyfus' Guilt was Arrived at by General Mercier-Constellation Caused.

London, Jan. 3.-The correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company at Bayonne, France, says that the Carlisle agitation in Spain is taking a new form. Agents of Don Carlos are trying to induce the people to engage in a movement in the Spanish Basque provinces tending toward reconstruction of the ancient kingdom of Navarre. The inhabitants of the French Basques, the dispatch adds, regard the movement favorably.

WOMAN'S VALOR RECOGNIZED. Athens, Jan. 3.-The Queen of Greece has bestowed the medal of valor on 100 women who served as nurses in the late war between Turkey and Greece.

PRONOUNCED IT A CANARD. Paris, Jan. 3.-M. Lockroy, minister of marine, is informed that the report of the massacre of a French lieutenant and 113 men in the New Hebrides is false.

ANGLO-SPANISH RELATIONS COR-DIAL. Madrid, Jan. 3.-Duke Almodovar del Rio, minister of foreign affairs, absolutely contradicts the pessimist rumors towards Spain. He declares that Spain's relations with England are of the most cordial nature.

FRENCH WAR MINISTER'S IDEA OF JUSTICE. London, Jan. 3.-A dispatch from Paris to the St. James' Gazette says that the gist of the testimony given before the court of cassation by General Mercier, who was minister of war at the time of the condemnation of Dreyfus, has become public. The former war minister's testimony, the dispatch says, amounts to a declaration that he arrived at a conviction of Dreyfus' guilt by a process of elimination. He first took the names of all of the officers who would be likely to be in possession of exclusive opportunities to perpetrate acts of treason by the disclosure of secret information, half of which he maintained he eliminated. Of these remaining he continued more and more were only three names left. Two of these were thrown out, leaving but one name, which was that of Dreyfus. It is stated that this testimony, calmly given by General Mercier, threw the judges into a state of consternation.

It is reported that General Mercier is about to crave British hospitality.

GLOOMY PICTURE. Paris, Jan. 3.-The Temps tonight draws a gloomy picture of the future of the United States. It says that the United States cannot hide the fact that they "have said good-bye for ever to the idyllic era wherein they dispensed with the regular standing army and laughed at the heavy burdens imposed upon the nations of the western continent by their international situation."

"There is not a Democrat, not a friend of principles that regulate modern society," continues the Temps, "that does not deplore bitterly the inoculation with a spirit of conquest of territories and expansion of a democracy that hitherto has been peaceful and liberal. President McKinley may say farewell to free America, to the era of peace and good-will, reforms, economy, internal progress and self-government."

NO BLOOD! Budapest, Jan. 3.-The duel between M. Horansky, a member of the lower house of the Hungarian Diet, and Baron Banffy, the premier, took place this morning. Pistols were the weapons used. The duel was bloodless.

A Quiet Election

Many Hundreds of Electors Stay at Home.

The Absence of a Keen Contest for the Mayoralty.

Dr. Wilson Re-Elected by Over 1,500 Plurality.

Eight New Men on the Board of Aldermen.

Messrs. Little and Jones Re-Elected Water Commissioners.

Mr. Thomas McCormick the Hospital Trustees-Two New Faces on the School Board-Mrs. Evans' Plucky Run-No Mass Meeting.

Mayor-Dr. John D. Wilson.

These were the successful candidates of yesterday.

The election was very quiet. It was absolutely devoid of exciting elements. The absence of general interest was shown in the decreased vote. In the Parnell-Wilson contest last year there were 6,758 ballots cast. This year the total was 3,600 less. The lack of interest for the mayoralty had its effect on the entire ticket. The votes for aldermen, school trustees, hospital trustee and water commissioners falling off in proportion.

Mayor Wilson won by 1,500 plurality over Mr. Taylor, and by a large majority over all candidates. There is no great surprise in this. The contests for water commissioners and hospital trustees were conducted very quietly and in a friendly spirit. On the school board the new men are Messrs. Colerick and Jones, in wards 2 and 3 respectively. The chief interest was in ward 4, where Mrs. Evans, made a phenomenal run against the chairman of the board of education.

The result in No. 1 ward was expected. The ward is to be congratulated on the return of Ald. Rumball to the council, as he did good work on the board in 1897. Ald. McPhillips' large vote is somewhat surprising. Ald. John Pritchard, the third member, is no stranger to the council.

In No. 2 there is no change. Ald. Jolly wrested from Ald. Douglass the honor of heading the poll.

In No. 5 ward Ald. Winnett had a close call and would probably have been defeated had ex-Ald. Sevelly remained in the field. New blood in the person of Mr. Wm. Reed took ex-Ald. Carrothers' old place at the head of the poll. It is no secret that Mr. Carrothers dropped out this year because he was disgusted with the administration of last year's council. Mr. S. J. Southcott, merchant tailor, was a good second in the race, making a capital run for a new man. He is expected to make a first-class alderman. Mr. David Rose, the Socialist Labor candidate, made a good showing in the race.

In No. 4 Ald. Graham again headed the poll, as was expected. He doubtless improved his position by his praiseworthy efforts for municipal reform. Mr. James Malloch is the only new representative. He made a splendid run, beating out such veterans as Ald. Garrett and ex-Ald. Cooper. The defeat of the latter was a surprise to his friends. He injured his chances by his attack on Mr. Little, Ald. Parnell and Ald. Graham at the meeting in No. 4 ward on Friday night.

The feature of the fifth ward contest was the excellent showing made by Ald. Plant, who was only 19 votes behind the rebellious Ald. Dreaney, who has headed the poll for years. Ald. Wilkey was re-elected, his independent course during the past year having won him many friends. In ex-Ald. F. J. Fitzgerald and Mr. Wm. Hayman, the ward also had good aldermanic material, but the fortunes of war were against them.

No. 6, as usual, furnishes a capable trio of aldermen. The electors indicated their pleasure at Ald. Parnell's return in a very substantial manner. Ald. McCallum is one of the ablest and most experienced members of the board. Last year was Ald. Greenless' first term in the council, and he proved an admirable public servant - level-headed and straightforward.

In the evening a crowd began to gather as usual, about 6 o'clock, in front of the Advertiser office, to watch the bulletins. From the first the relative positions of the mayoralty candidates were clearly indicated. The crowd on the streets increased in numbers considerably, but showed a supreme indifference as to the character of the returns. There was absolutely no enthusiasm. About 8 o'clock Mayor Wilson appeared in the window of the Free Press office. He briefly thanked the electors for his handsome majority and, after referring to the sad accident of a year ago, stated that there would be no meeting in the City Hall and no speech-making.

Mayor Wilson's plurality was 1,556, and the majority over all 898.
