Toronto Foundryman Hit by a 1,200 Pound Core

Toronto, Aug. 7.-Crushed to death by having a 1,200-pound core fall on him was the fate of a Macedonian named Tony Chris at the Canada Foundry, at Berkeley and Front streets, about 10 o'clock this morning.
