

STREET RAILWAY "IN WRONG"; TOOK CARS OFF IN "FLU" PERIOD

Didn't Even Say "By Your Leave."

NEW PLAN GOVERNMENT

Scheme Outlined to Handle City Affairs: When Controllers Disappear.

Cutting off some of the trippers during the "flu" epidemic without first consulting No. 1 committee put the London Street Railway Company "in wrong" with some of the members of the committee, who had been rather inclined to allow the company some leeway in the schedule while conditions were abnormal. Manager C. B. King of the company appeared at the adjourned meeting of No. 1 committee last night to discuss the situation.

Controller S. H. Merryfield proposed that the company be asked to add some cars to the Hamilton road line during the rush hours, which most complaints have been made. It was decided to have this done and have a report for the next meeting as to the results.

Controller Merryfield was rather inclined to think that Manager King had put on over the committee by cutting off the cars for telling the members at a former meeting that he would consult them before making any further changes in the schedule.

Not Fair to Committee. "I don't think it has been fair to the men on this committee and the council who have felt disposed to treat the company considerably," said Controller Merryfield.

Under the circumstances of the "flu" epidemic we could not wait two weeks for a meeting of this committee before we cut out the trippers," replied Manager King.

"Why did you have to take off the trippers?" asked Mayor C. H. Somerville.

"There was no necessity for it," was the excuse. "That makes no difference," rather warmly retorted the mayor. "If you are going to take that stand I am going to take the stand that the company will have to restore the former schedule. You cannot take off two or three cars any time you feel like it."

Controller Merryfield thought the members of the committee should know if for any reason the former had to be cut down so they could form the people who make complaints regarding the service.

Major Somerville: "Well, you never know if some cars when an emergency arises."

Chairman F. R. Harley asked if the company often had emergencies.

Emergency Last Monday. Manager King said that it had to face an emergency last Monday when it could not run the cars on account of the parade. Mayor Somerville said that he had been consulted on that occasion. It was pointed out that the company lost \$7,000 revenue on account of the "flu."

This loss was partly due to the taking off of the cars, according to the mayor. He said that he had seen several cars pass Dundas street on Richmond that were loaded to capacity, and many passengers had been left standing on the corner. Manager King should have been put into service, he thought.

Returning to the question of schedule, Mr. King suggested that it is easier for the public to keep tabs on the cars on the fifteen-minute schedule than on a twelve-minute one.

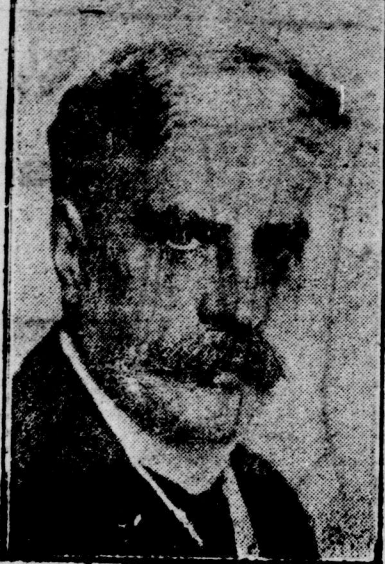
Controller E. S. Little suggested that an hourly schedule would be easier to remember. He also intimated that the publishing of a time table by the company might educate the public.

Ald. C. G. Moorhead's resolution in the council, asking this committee to consider submitting the street railway question to the railway board, was laid over.

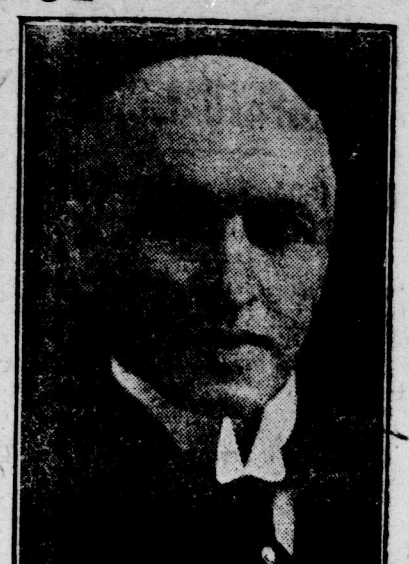
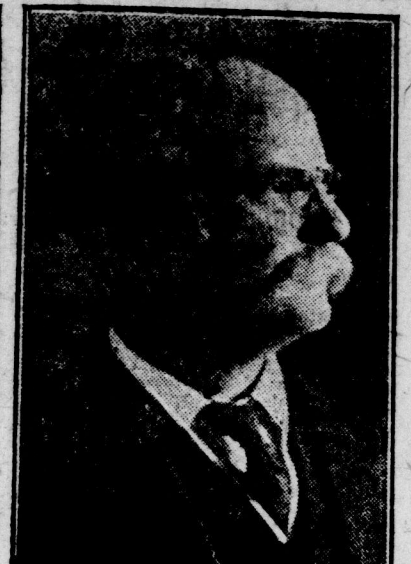
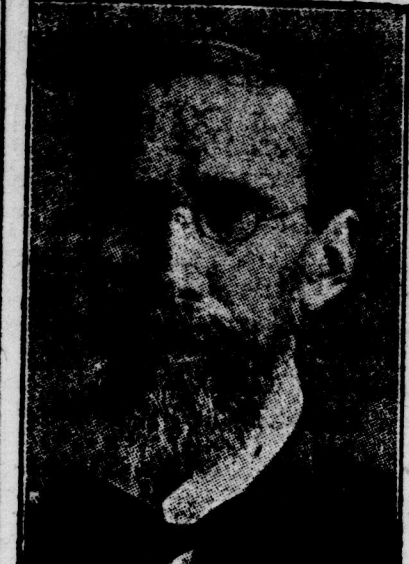

LONDON WOMAN TO HEAD WOMEN'S AID OF DISTRICT NO. 1

Will Nominate V. A. D. Workers for Hospital.

ALSO NAMES CANDIDATES

Who Wish to Train as Masseuses and Functional Workers.

A big honor has been conferred on Mrs. J. B. McKillop, O. C. of the Lord Klitchner Nursing Division, this city, in that she has been appointed Lady District Superintendent of the Women's Aid Department, Military District No. 1.

She shared this honor with two other women in Ontario, Mrs. A. E. Gooderham of Toronto, Military District No. 2, and Mrs. Hunter Ogilvy of Kingston, Military District No. 3. There are only seven lady district superintendents in Canada.

This organization which was authorized by an order-in-council in August last, is known as the Women's Aid Department to the St. John Ambulance Brigade Overseas within the Dominion of Canada, and aims to centralize the work which will be done by women in the military hospitals throughout Canada.

V. A. D. nursing members, functional masseuses, clerks, stenographers, telephone operators, housemaids, charwomen and sewing women, will all be under the supervision of this Women's Aid Department.

Mrs. McKillop, being lady district superintendent of this district, will have the final nomination of all V. A. D. nurses for the various hospitals and the candidates for functional training and massage at Hart House, selecting the names from those submitted by the St. John Ambulance officers in this district.

Uniform. The uniform of the members of the department will be the regulation St. John Ambulance uniform, and that which the lady superintendent, Mrs. McKillop, will wear is a black suit, with the St. John Ambulance stripes and epaulettes, grey hat and dark grey military coat. This uniform is similar to the one worn by Lady Percy, who is also a lady superintendent of this order overseas.

The age limit for masseuses is 22 to 35 years, and they must serve a probation of six months at Hart House. Their salary will be paid by the department of militia and defence, supervising masseuses getting \$75 and head masseuses \$85 per month. For the first two months masseuses are considered untrained and receive no pay, but afterwards the rate of payment is \$85 a month.

General service members must be from 15 to 50 years of age and serve one month's probation, receiving pay for the whole time at the rate of \$20. General service superintendents, \$75; assistant superintendents, \$55; head clerk, \$50; clerk, \$45; stenographers, \$45; telephone operators, \$30; head housemaid, \$20; charwomen, \$20; sewing women, \$20.

In all cases an allowance is made for uniform, and food, living quarters and laundry if the worker does not live in the hospital.

LONDON AND MIDDLESEX BREAK ALL RECORDS IN THE LOAN DRIVE; CITY HOISTS HONOR FLAG TODAY

\$704,950 Subscribed in City Yesterday, Bringing Total to \$7,250,650, Just \$50,000 Below the Original Objective—Headquarters Will Raise That \$50,000 in Time for Ceremony at Noon.

London rose to the occasion in the Victory Loan drive today. As a result of the endeavors of the salesmen and headquarters staff \$704,950 was subscribed yesterday, bringing the total to \$7,250,650, just \$50,000 short of the original objective of \$7,300,000.

"We've Got To Do It." "We've got to work hard to get that extra \$50,000, needed to gain the second objective of \$7,300,000," said Chairman Reid last night, "and I feel confident that the citizens won't let us fall down. We need the money, and they need a good investment, and I think that we can do it together on this."

Secretary M. Kaplansky and his industrial staff worked late again last night arranging the day's subscriptions. The factories and business houses again dipped deep into their pockets yesterday, and have now left their objectives far behind. Their total yesterday had reached \$824,700, and Organizer Norman Towell and his crew are after a million dollars each. There will be no hot time if they get it.

TURPENTINE ADVANCES ON PEACE NEWS; OTHER LINES FOLLOW EXAMPLE. Hardware and Metal, November 16, will say.

A sharp advance in turpentine is recorded this week, amounting to 12 cents per gallon. This may be termed one of the first lines to reflect conditions which have followed signing of armistice and is in line with situation outlined in Hardware and Metal during the past few weeks.

There is no indication that the peak has yet been reached. Government reports from the United States show more than required for United States needs. It is further pointed out that next year's production will not be any larger than for the past season.

Lined oil is another line which has undergone revision upward. Advances of four to five cents have been registered, and indications point to even higher levels as well within the realm of possibility. Prices on seed have been recovering from recent depression during the past two weeks, and since Monday the price of horse nails is included in the list to go to higher levels, today being up just one cent per pound over former prices. Lace leather has gone higher, prices today being about 25 cents per pound over previous quotations.

Other lines included in the list to follow the upward trend this week are drills, blowers, force, mouse and rat traps, charcoal and wheelbarrows. An advance of about 5 per cent is reported.

DOMINION POLICE IN CITY STILL KEEPING AFTER DESERTERS

Safety first! Carry your papers till official notice is received from Ottawa that it is no longer necessary to do so. Minard of the Dominion Police, Capt. Minard has received orders from the Adjutant-General at Ottawa, that no further arrests of deserters under the M.S.A. are to be made and all proceedings against deserters are to be stopped pending further instructions.

Mr. Minard stated that he has passed effect, but had told them to still keep after deserters, and that is his reason for advising people to carry their papers, as they might be taken for deserters.

County's Best Showing. Middlesex County is at last taking a real interest in the loan, Thursday's total reaching \$248,000. This is by far the best day the county canvassers have yet experienced.

The county decided to subscribe \$25,000 worth of bonds, and have provided for that amount from the sinking fund. The grand total of the county now stands at \$1,567,050. Three hundred and sixty-three subscriptions were received in Thursday's mail. Organizer G. E. Cork is greatly pleased at the manner in which the county is now buying bonds.
