More cars should have been put into service, he thought. Returning to the question of schedule Mr. King suggested that it is easier for the public to keep tab on the cars on the fifteen-minute schedule than on a twelve-minute one.







The age limit for nursing members is from 21 to 48 years, and they must serve a probation of one month. Functional trainers may be from 21 to 50 years of age, and will serve three months' probation at Hart House, Toronto.

Salaries Arranged.

The age limit for masseuses is 22 to 38 years, and they must serve a probation of six months at Hart House. Their salary will be paid by the department of militia and defence, supervisory masseuses getting \$75 and head masseuses \$65 per month. For the first two months masseuses are considered untrained and receive no pay, but afterwards the rate of payment is \$55 a month. month.

General service members must be from 18 to 50 years of age and serve one month's probation, receiving pay the whole time at the following rates: General service superintendent, \$75 a month; assistant superintendent, \$75, head clerk, \$50; clerks, \$45; stenographers, \$45; telephone operators, \$30; head cooks, \$50; assistant cooks, \$40; housemaids, \$20; charwomen, \$20; sewing women, \$20.
