QUESTION OF CHURCH UNION

Brussels and Waterloo Street Churches Reject Proposal--Leinster Street Adopts it.

The proposed union of Waterloo street, Brussels street and Leinster street Baptist churches, the united congregations to use Leinster street plant, was given a setback...

Resolved, that we do not accept this resolution, because, "Resolved, that in our opinion it is not desirable to move two churches from this locality, and because the financial burden would be too great."

In explanation of the last clause of the resolution it was stated that there is a mortgage of only \$500 on the Brussels street plant whereas on the Leinster street church is \$9,000. It was said that this burden would not be too great if the whole strength of the three congregations could be counted on.

Leinster street church voted unanimously for the union. The meeting was largely attended and there was no adverse sentiment expressed by any of the speakers.

Speeches were made by E. L. Rising, John Barnett, Geo. Mitchell, T. L. Hay, A. A. Wilson, J. E. Vincent and Mrs. J. E. Dean, who spoke on behalf of Mr. Deane, who was absent. With the exception of Mr. Mitchell, who favored taking more time for consideration, the speakers were all in favor of immediate action for union.

It was proposed to hold joint meetings of the committee to settle the details in connection with amalgamation. By a vote of 49 to 13 the Waterloo street church decided to take up the amalgamation project.

A general discussion followed, but the feeling of the meeting seemed decidedly adverse to union in any form. Those in favor of the union idea argued along the lines of Mr. Proser and those opposing the union, which was first proposed in the large district there would be two churches in one hall and but one in the other, and that, not only a family church, secondly because the Waterloo street church was free from debt and it was not therefore wise to take up such a project.

MOB STONED BERNHARDT

Famous French Actress Left Quebec Under Police Protection.

Quebec, Dec. 6.—(Special)—It took forty Quebec policemen to protect Madame Sarah Bernhardt from being mobbed as she was about to take her departure from Quebec last night.

A number of French-Canadian newspaper men were at the Chateau Frontenac on Monday to interview the famous actress, who received them courteously but was somewhat indiscreet in her utterances against Canada and Canadians in general.

She said Canada was a fine country but without men; it was a country with a mixed population composed of English, Irish, Scotch, French-Canadians and Iroquois. It had no men, no artists, no men of science, and those who called themselves French-Canadians had no French blood in their veins.

This interview was published in "Evening" and inflamed the passions of the French-Canadians, especially the students of Laval University, who held an indignation meeting and decided to manifest their displeasure by a public demonstration against the actress at her departure.

In the meantime the police authorities received information of the impending trouble and a force was called out to protect Madame Bernhardt. These were stationed in hiding behind the Montcalm market place until after the performance in the Auditorium, when they took up a position in front of the theatre.

Madame Bernhardt was cheered when she left the auditorium and drove towards the C. P. R. station but she was pelted with stale eggs at several points along the line.

The police refused to allow the mob to enter the station and the trouble took place on the outside. Ottawa, Dec. 6.—(Special)—Madame Sarah Bernhardt arrived in the city at noon today and had lunch with the Governor-General and Lady Grey at Government House. Madame Bernhardt sends the following letter to the press:

"I must formally deny certain phrases attributed to me through the columns of the 'Evening' regarding the Canadian people. I have never, never stated, on my word of honor, that the Canadian people were Iroquois. I did say it was true that the Canadians have made great progress in agriculture but not in literature and art. Last evening two or three hundred young men assailed two women of my company with sticks and

stones and severely wounded them about the head. I ask if those young men were Canadians? I do not believe it.

About 7 o'clock last evening fire broke out in a barn in Sheriff street and an alarm was rung in. No. 5 engine responded and soon had the fire extinguished. The barn, which is the property of Ernest Williams, contained hay and other inflammables. Mr. Williams estimated his loss at about \$250, partly covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is unknown.
