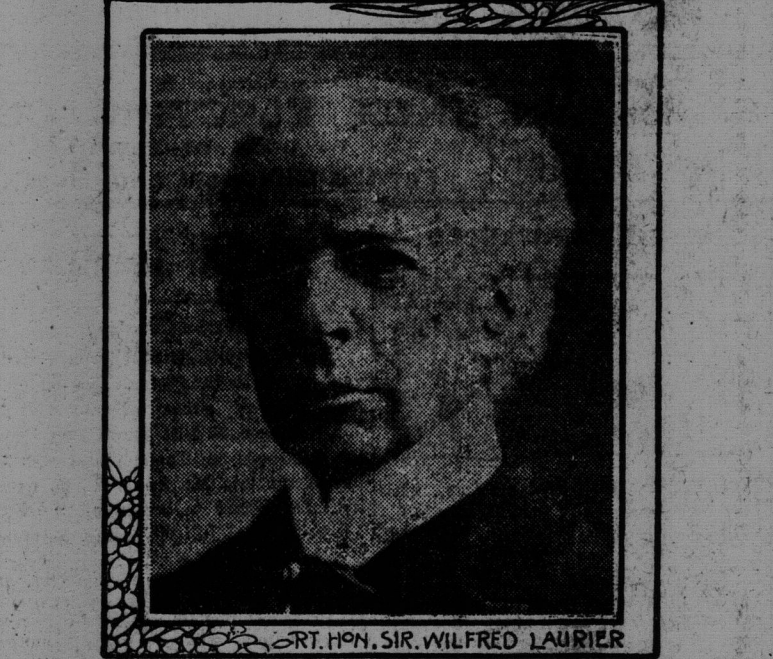

**Sir Wilfrid Laurier**  
**74 Years Old Today**

Sir Wilfrid Laurier is seventy-four years old today. He will receive the congratulations of every loyal Canadian from ocean to ocean, irrespective of party, for it is one of the marks of his public life that even in the stress and storm of politics he has known how to win and to retain the personal respect of his opponents in debate as he has the love and devotion of those who have for so long honored him as their political leader.

Having more than attained to the promise of human ripeness of "three score years and ten" he is active and patriotic as ever, first in keeping the strictest line the dropping politics during the war and then in recruiting, especially in his native Quebec. The reputation that Sir Wilfrid enjoys is not confined to Canada. He is unquestionably the best known of the Canadian statesmen in Europe. Sir Wilfrid was born in St. Lin, Quebec, Nov. 20, 1841.

**SAYS SYNDICATE OF BALKAN KINGS IS KAISER'S WORK**

Germany Received Assurances None Would Harm Her While Same Would Aid — What Dr. Dillon Asserts

(By Dr. Dillon)

Rome, Nov. 18.—(Delayed)—The Balkan Peninsula will remain the centre of political interest until the danger of further treachery from neutral states has been definitely dispelled. I write with first hand knowledge of facts, not all of which are yet realized or even known. For example, the circumstance is not yet appreciated nor generally believed that the league of monarchs pre-arranged by the Kaiser was completed in principle before the war broke out, and that the original conception was more comprehensive than the final achievement. This falling off between intention and realization was due in great part, not to resistance on the part of monarchs tempted, but solely to the veto of certain of their influential subjects. ness of Germany, who forestalled the unsuspecting Entente Powers, formed a syndicate of kings, and began by obtaining assurances that none would harm, while some would help her.

The only way in which the Entente Powers could at any time thwart the Teuton schemes was by deploying greater military and naval forces than are their's today. More perceptibly than ever before the adoption of this method postulated by events. The assurances of benevolent neutrality lavished by Premier Skouloudis are less solemn and less binding than the formal treaty obligations assumed by all Greece towards Serbia. They are far less solid than the promises made by Venizelos, who was blocked by the king, cabinet, parliament and the nation at the time, and is now being systematically disavowed.

How could the Entente States accept assurances, however solemn, from any minister or cabinet appointed by the king, for special purposes of carrying out Germany's designs against themselves?

Ninety Venizelist deputies under 44 years of age have become liable to military service since the dissolution of the chamber. They have petitioned the war minister to grant them one month leave of absence for electoral purposes, and the war minister, who is Constantine's right-hand man, has refused the request, for the king is determined at all costs to create a Germanophile parliament, hostile to the Entente powers.

"Yet he expects these powers to rely upon the oral promise of a provisional minister that the allies need apprehend no stab in the back. Venizelos himself is alleged to have replied two days ago to a number of merchants of Athens and Piræus, who exhorted him to allow his party to take an active hand in the elections: 'I am of the opinion that abstention is advisable under the prevailing circumstances, for even if the Liberals won the electoral campaign and were returned to parliament in a majority, they would still find it impossible to realize their programme.'"

That means that even if the Greek people again announce their determination to do their duty and eschew disloyalty, the field-marshal of the Prussian army would none the less execute his brother-in-law's designs.

Effective constraint in Greece's interest and our own, is the only method that can now be employed with any hope of success.
